OPEN SESSION

<u>Agenda Item 1 – Call the meeting to Order / Roll Call / Pledge of Allegiance/ Establishment of Quorum</u>

The meeting was called to order at 10:00 am.

Agenda Item 2 -Welcome -Chairman's opening remarks

Chairman Carvelli invited those who wish to attend, to the June 29- July 2, 2017, North American Boxing Federation's (NABF) conference in San Diego, CA.

He spoke on the logistics of assigning events with officials and inspector personnel. He reiterated that receiving assignments is a privilege and not a right, and commended Executive Officer (EO) Andy Foster's work of distributing the assignments in a fair and equitable manner.

He added that the Large Event Subcommittee, specifically Commissioner Martha Shen-Urquidez, has been working very hard toward making a case for the Canelo vs. GGG fight to be held at a California venue. He offered his assistance in those efforts.

Agenda Item 3 - Approval of the March 13, 2017, Commission Meeting Minutes

Commissioner Shen-Urquidez motioned to approve the March 13, 2017, Commission Meeting minutes.

Vice Chair Lehman seconded the motion.

The motion passed 6-0 by roll call vote.

There was no Commission discussion or public comment.

Agenda Item 4 – Approval of the March 14, 2017, Commission Meeting Minutes

Vice Chair Lehman motioned to approve the March 14, 2017, Commission Meeting minutes as amended.

Commissioner Dr. Williams seconded the motion.

The motion passed 6-0 by roll call vote.

There was no Commission discussion.

Public Comment:

 Mr. Greg Patschull provided comments regarding the Executive Officer's Report and the Emergency Headgear regulation.

<u>Agenda Item 8 – Review and approval of Commission 10 Point Plan to address severe dehydration from extreme weight cutting in mixed martial arts</u>

EO Foster presented the Commission with a PowerPoint presentation outlining the dangers of dehydration and cutting weight as well as what steps the Commission can take with his 10 Point Plan (Plan).

He stated that he has determined this issue to be one of the Commission's primary health and safety concerns and recommended the approval of the measures to prevent athletes from using severe dehydration as a method to make the contracted bout weight at events regulated in California. He further recommended that the Commission consider immediate implementation of this plan with a six-month review period, during which time the Commission will invite stakeholder feedback and revise the plan where appropriate.

Commissioner Shen-Urquidez motioned to approve the 10 Point Plan with 6-month review period. Commissioner Dr. Williams seconded the motion.

Commission Discussion:

- Commissioner Martha Shen-Urquidez
 - o <u>Item #3:</u> Commissioner Shen-Urquidez mentioned that she recalls pushback on adding the additional weight classes from a couple of the larger stakeholders and asked if those concerns are still present. EO Foster responded that those stakeholders no longer have those same concerns.

o <u>Item #9:</u> Bellator's concern of liability with knowing the weight of an athlete before the official weigh-in. Legal Counsel Gary Duke responded that the Commission has the authority to do so legally, but it will at this point only be a recommendation so there would not be a liability on the Commission to proceed.

• Vice Chair Mary Lehman

- Item #2: After commending EO Foster for his hard work on this plan she asked him to clarify the reward for fighters who would take a fight against a larger opponent. EO Foster responded that the losing or smaller fighter would be compensated for continuing with the fight although they are at a disadvantage.
- <u>Item #7:</u> She mentioned that the Commission is limited, by statute, to 30 hours between the official weigh – in and the event. She asked EO Foster if that is something that the Commission should consider changing. EO Foster responded that he would need direction from the Commission to move forward with that change.
- She mentioned that in some ways promoters and matchmakers are more responsible for weight cutting issues if they continue to propose bouts at inappropriate weights.
- She also mentioned that she would like to see the plan emphasize the importance of the dangers of dehydration and weight cutting, specifically its relation to the concerns with concussions and other neurological injuries.
 - EO Foster explained that although there are huge health risks with dehydration, they brain is actually one of the last things to dehydrate and deferred to Commissioner Dr. Williams to explain further.
 - Commissioner Dr. Williams agreed and stated that the brain is considered the most important, and is there for the last organ to have problems when it comes to dehydration. He further mentioned that the concern would be with neurological reaction times resulting in a lack of protection during the bout.

• Commissioner Dr. Vernon Williams

- Commissioner Dr. Williams acknowledged the potential for increased risk on the higher level shows also includes the public aspect, considering that tickets are sold to watch particular fights and if/when they fall through the value of those tickets may change.
 - Mr. Duke suggested that there is also a financial incentive to cut weight with the higher level events as the purse amounts are significantly greater.
- o Dr. Williams asked EO Foster if he is aware of or foresees any unintended consequences to this Plan.
 - EO Foster stated that he doesn't want the fighters to cut weight twice, and come in under the 10% threshold. He explained that the licensing by weight class and use of Specific Gravity Strips should balance this issue.

Commissioner Luis Ayala

o <u>Item #3:</u> Commissioner Ayala asked how the additional weight classes compare to Professional Boxing weight classes and if the issues with the large weight-gap are

also prevalent in Boxing. He also asked EO Foster if the suggested weight classes would be in addition to or replace certain classes.

- EO Foster responded that the proposed weight classes would be inserted in between and be in addition to the current weight classes.
- He asked EO Foster why the increase of the weight classes goes from 5 pound differences to 10 pound moving into the higher classes.
- o <u>Item #6 & 7</u>: He stated that these items are seemingly tricky to enforce and that the Plan still leaves a window of opportunity for athletes to dehydrate.
 - EO Foster explained that each item of the Plan is not stand-alone and that it is necessary to use all items in the Plan for it to work.
- Commissioner Ayala asked EO Foster how prevalent the weight cutting issue is in the sport of Boxing and wondered about the need for the measures to be taken with boxers, as well.
 - EO Foster explained that he is fully aware that everyone cuts weight; however, based on the studies that the Commission staff and field personnel have been able to put together, the issue is extreme and almost exclusive to the sport of Mixed Martial Arts.

Commissioner Van Gordon Sauter

- Commissioner Sauter asked EO Foster how he intends on carrying the 10 Point Plan document to industry and to the public.
 - EO Foster explained that many stakeholders have been involved in the process of assembling the Plan, and those that have not, have been providing their comments. He further explained that two of the largest stakeholders, UFC and Bellator MMA, have publicly supported the Plan.
 - Commissioner Shen-Urquidez asked EO Foster if he intends to send the Plan to the Association of Boxing Commissions (ABC). EO Foster responded that he plans to present the Plan at the ABC conference in July 2017.
- Commissioner Sauter suggested that EO Foster consider pushing the Plan through the larger newspapers as well. He asked EO Foster if he foresees or has already received resistance from any organization.
 - EO Foster responded that he does not foresee that happening and explained that his plan is to get the fighters in the correct weight classes.
- o Commissioner Sauter inquired about EO Foster's timing on the implementation.
 - EO Foster stated that he is shooting for June 15, 2017.

Chairman John Carvelli

<u>Item #7:</u> Chairman Carvelli suggested that language be added which explains that the rationale for the timing is that the timing for the weigh-in is specified in statute.

> Chairman Carvelli stated that he is comfortable that the Plan has been created appropriately and collectively compiled. He mentioned that he would like to see a report on the Plan at future meetings.

Public Comment:

 Mr. Roy Englebrecht commented that the Commission suspends and penalizes for drugs and suggested that the Commission consider doing the same for missing weight.

Vice Chair Lehman further mentioned that she would like to discuss this at the next Commission meeting. EO Foster agreed and explained that the hope is that the Plan will prevent the missing weight issue.

The motion passed 6-0 by roll call vote

Agenda Item 9 – Review and possible action of Petition to Change the Decision for Josh Thomson vs. Patricky Friere at the Bellator event on February 17, 2017, in San Jose, CA EO Foster provided the Commission with background on the appeal and stated that the video evidence clearly shows that there was an unintentional clash of the heads. However, he explained that he is not convinced that the clash is what caused Mr. Thomson to lose the bout because when Mr. Thomson fell from the headbutt he braced his fall, performed technical standing to rise to his feet quickly, raised his hands to engage in the fight, and then shot what looked to be a takedown attempt. It was during the takedown attempt that Mr. Friere countered with a quick right-hand uppercut that dropped Mr. Thomson and then he followed up with a few hammer-fists before referee John McCarthy stopped the contest. EO Foster acknowledged the possibility that the headbutt may have contributed to Mr. Thomson being dazed, but the referee did not call it and Mr. Thomson also did not notify the referee.

EO Foster stated that although he acknowledges that the clash did happen, he doesn't believe it is enough to overturn the result of the bout and take the win away from Mr. Friere.

Commissioner Shen-Urquidez motioned to not overturn the decision of the bout.

Vice Chair Lehman seconded the motion.

Commission Discussion:

- Vice Chair Lehman commented that she agrees with EO Foster's comments and
 mentioned that a fighter must prepare in their training for what to do when they get hurt in a
 bout. She stated that it appears that he was not prepared and the consequences of that
 should not justify a change of decision.
- Commissioner Shen-Urquidez stated that she was at the fight and did not notice any
 indication that he needed time to recover and the stance that he completed after the
 incident is not easy to do, that it requires voluntary actions from the athlete to complete that
 stance.

The motion passed 6-0 by roll call vote.

Agenda Item 10 – Review and possible action of Petition to Change the Decision for Ivan Redkach vs. Algenis Mendez at the TGB Promotions event on May 2, 2017, in Studio City, CA

EO Foster provided background on the appeal and presented the Commission with the video footage of the bout.

Mr. Mike Goossen, counsel for Mr. Redkach, requested that the Commission reverse the decision of the bout on the basis that after review of the video evidence, it was clear to him that it was not a slip.

Referee Raul Caiz Jr. presented the Commission with his recollection of the bout and explained that he had given Mr. Redkach several warnings before the point deduction. He stated that in the rules meeting before the bout he warned both fighters of the rules, as well as during the bout it appeared that Mr. Redkach was more reckless with the headbutts and ultimately warned Mr. Redkach four separate times.

Commissioner Shen-Urquidez stated that she watched the bout multiple times and could see one warning for head butts issued to Mr. Redkach.

Lead Inspector Mark Relyea stated that he was present at the fight and confirmed that there were warnings given both in the ring as well as in the corners which was not shown in the video footage.

Mr. Caiz Jr. commented that in the third round when the point was deducted, he saw Mr. Redkach throw two punches, missing both, and then tucked his head and lunged to ram his head toward his opponent. He stated for that reason, he felt it was intentional and that was the rationale for the point deduction at that time. He further explained to the Commission his recollection of the incident in round 6 which he indicated was a slip. He stated that he was in position to see Mr. Redkach throw the punch and saw an unintentional trip by Mr. Redkach's lead foot which cause Mr. Mendez to fall. He stated that the Commission's policy is that if there is a slip or a trip, caused by an accidental or unintentional foul, it should not be deemed a knockdown.

Commissioner Shen-Urquidez requested that Lead Inspector Mark Relyea give his recollection of the bout with regard to the incident in round 6. Mr. Relyea stated that his impression was that it was a knockdown but that the recognizes that Mr. Mendez fell awkwardly. He explained that he spoke to two of the judges of the bout, both of which indicated to him that they believed it was a knockdown. He further stated he did not see any other significant touching of the opponent other than the punch.

Commissioner Shen-Urquidez asked Mr. Caiz Jr. to explain the ring mechanics and the difference between a trip and a slip. Mr. Caiz Jr. explained that the ring mechanics would be essentially the same and demonstrated the signal for no knockdown. He did acknowledge that there is a technical difference between a trip and a slip and that this was definitely a trip.

Vice Chair Lehman asked Mr. Caiz Jr. to explain his experience in refereeing, specifically refereeing bouts between southpaw vs. orthodox fighters. Mr. Caiz Jr. explained that he is very experienced in refereeing and referees about 15-30% of his bouts are southpaw vs. orthodox fighters.

Chairman Carvelli asked Mr. Caiz Jr. to share his recollection of the straight left punch. Mr. Caiz Jr. responded that he has viewed the punch in video footage several times and acknowledged that the punch landed, however he further stated that he remains confident in his call that the punch did not have any impact on Mr. Mendez going down.

Mr. Goossen commented that the video footage clearly shows that there was significant separation between the athletes. Commissioner Ayala requested that the video be shown again to see the separation of the fighters, as this was something newly mentioned and was not the focus of the first viewing.

Commissioner Dr. Williams asked Mr. Caiz Jr. if there was anything that indicated that Mr. Mendez was hurt by the punch as he was getting up. Mr. Caiz Jr. stated that he did not see any such

indication and that he did notice that as he has falling, Mr. Mendez turned his head to see what was tripping him and he popped right back up.

Vice Chair Lehman motioned to let the decision of the bout stand as it is.

Commissioner Dr. Williams seconded the motion.

The motion passed 4-2 by roll call vote. Ayala – Yes; Dr. Williams – Yes; Sauter – Yes; Shen-Urquidez – No; Lehman – Yes; Carvelli – No.

Agenda Item 6 - Executive Officer's Report

a. <u>Budget Update for the Support Fund, the Neurological Fund, and Pension Program</u>
EO Foster reported that the Commission's budget through Fiscal Month 9 (March) is \$1,204,353 in revenue and \$1,132,757 in expenditures. He further reported that the current fund balance (reserve fund) for economic uncertainties is at \$1,158,089.

b. Report on Pending and Proposed Regulations and Legislation

EO Foster provided a summary of the pending regulations.

- Payment to Contestants No updates since the last meeting. He explained that the Rulemaking file was published by Office of Administrative Law (OAL) on 8/12/16 and a public hearing was held on 9/26/16 and the final package was submitted to Legal Counsel for review and approval on 10/31/16.
- Headgear EO Foster explained that OAL had concerns with the Final Rulemaking File and returned the file for changes to be made and explained the changes that Assistant Executive Officer Sophia Cornejo is working on.
- Weighing Time, Time for Physical Examinations, and Dehydration and Rehydration EO
 Foster reported that this Rulemaking package is pending approval at the Department of
 Finance.

c. Status Update of Delegated Entities

California Amateur Mixed Martial Arts Organization (CAMO)

Mr. JT Steele, President, reported the status of CAMO's operations, mentioning that CAMO is noticing a strong trend in new athletes and new promoters and explained that he anticipates 15% growth in 2017 over 2016. He reported that CAMO's director of operations, Mrs. Megan Sonderegger will be reducing her hours and her full-time position will soon be replaced with two part-time positions. He reviewed a couple of new events that CAMO will be regulating, new venues which he anticipates being very successful.

Vice Chair Lehman requested that the event schedule be integrated into the reports submitted for each Commission meeting.

Mr. Steele reported that although CAMO is not a youth organization and therefore does not fall under AB2007, they have instituted mandatory concussion training for all officials.

USA Boxing

Mr. Joe Zanders, President USA Boxing's Southern California and representative for USA Boxing, presented the Commission with the highlights of their Junior Olympic Tournament

and the upcoming Regional Junior Olympic Tournament in Indio, CA. He reported that they are currently recruiting officials and encourage anyone interested in officiating to come to the USA Boxing Official's Clinic on June 3, 2017, in Westminster, CA.

Vice Chair Lehman requested that the event schedule be integrated into the reports submitted for each Commission meeting.

Commissioner Shen-Urquidez mentioned that although she appreciates Mr. Zander's attendance on behalf of USA Boxing, she would like to see reports and attendance from the other California LBCs within USA Boxing.

United States Fight League (USFL)

Mr. John Frank presented the Commission with the results of the events since the last Commission meeting, injury statistics since becoming a delegated entity and explained the types of injuries and ages of those hurt during bouts.

Vice Chair Lehman asked what percentage these injuries compare to the adult mixed martial arts' injuries. EO Foster responded that the numbers are low in comparison. Vice Chair Lehman inquired about the nature of the injuries and wondered if they indicate the necessity for any rule changes. Mr. Frank responded that their rule is that any illegal strike results in a foul, whether it was intentional or not.

EO Foster asked Mr. Frank to give his impression on the use of the headgear. Mr. Frank responded that there have been a couple of issues with the fitting, however he does believe that it has perhaps prevented a few injuries which is good. Mr. Frank also spoke to the need for Ringside Physicians. Commissioner Shen-Urquidez mentioned that she has made attempts to coordinate with the medical school at University of California, San Francisco to see if she could create some interest with their sports medicine residents.

International Kickboxing Federation (IKF)

Mr. Steve Fossum, President of IKF, presented that they have implemented the training as required by AB2007. He reiterated Mr. Frank's concerns with the lack of Ringside Physicians on the amateur side. EO Foster spoke to how they are currently coordinating doctors with the Pro/Am shows and mentioned that Mr. Steele from CAMO has been a great help with finding doctors to fill in on last minute shows.

d. Update on C3 Logix Sports Concussion Management Program

EO Foster reported that Commission staff has been actively performing baseline examinations on many fighters throughout the state with only 7 units. The Commission has tested over 200 athletes with a goal of 500-600 by the end of the year.

He explained that the rest of the purchased devices were received during the first week of May and C3 Logix was recently on-site to configure, tag and assign the devices.

EO Foster reported that the Pension Fund Subcommittee is continuing to work on outreach, there are 46 boxers who are eligible for a pension distribution in 2017, and that the Commission has approved \$55,730 in pension payments so far, this year.

Commissioner Shen-Urquidez requested EO Foster to produce a story that she can take to the press about the Boxer's Pension Fund.

Mr. Thomas Taylor, Ring Official, commented to commend the Commission field personnel.

Vice Chair Lehman asked if the proposed changes sufficiently address OAL's concerns. AEO Cornejo confirmed that the documents were sent to OAL for a preliminary review by their attorney. She further stated that although the attorney could not give her an approval without a Commission vote, he agreed that the proposal was acceptable and should be submitted once approved by the Commission.

A. Budget Update for the Support Fund, the Neurological Fund, and Pension program.

The Commission's budget update for the support fund through the end of Fiscal Year 16-17 (Fiscal Month 12) is \$1,559,728 in revenue and \$1,561,280 in expenditures.

The Commission's budget update for the Boxers Pension Fund through the end of Fiscal Year 16-17 (Fiscal Month 12) is 341,202.95 in revenue and transfers and \$100,827 in expenditures.

The Commission's budget update for the Neurological Examination Account through the end of Fiscal Year 16-17 is \$13,205.55 in revenue and \$50,199 in expenditures.

B. Report on Pending and Proposed Regulations

- 1. Payment of Contestants No updates since the last meeting. The Rulemaking file was published by the Office of Administrative Law (OAL) on 8/12/16 and a public hearing was held on 9/26/16. The final package was submitted to Legal Counsel for review and approval on 10/31/16.
- 2. Headgear The OAL approved this file on July 18, 2017.
- 3. Weighing Time, Time for Physical Examinations, and Dehydration and Rehydration The OAL approved this file on July 12, 2017.
- 4. Examination of Boxer Applicants and Neurological Assessment This is on the agenda as a septate item for discussion.
- 5. Headgear for Amateur Kickboxing This is on the agenda as a septate item for discussion.

D. Update on C3 Logix Sports Concussion Management Program

The Commission finalized written procedures for C3 Logix Neurological testing and continues to perform baseline examinations on many fighters throughout the state. We have also distributed approximately 20 units to Lead Inspectors. The Commission has tested over 250 athletes with a goal of 500-600 by the end of the year. With the new fiscal year starting, we have additional appropriation now and testing has resumed. I am still confident that 500-600 athletes by year end is attainable.

E. Update on CSAC 10-Point Plan to Address Severe Dehydration and Weight Cutting in MMA.

The 10-Point Plan to address severe dehydration in mixed martial arts is in effect and was recently used at UFC 214. The average weight gain across all athletes at the UFC was 7.79%, with no athletes "severely dehydrated" (a urine specific gravity of higher than 1.025) on fight day.

G. Update on the July 22-26, 2017, Association of Boxing Commissions and Association of Ringside Physicians Annual Conference

The Association or Ringside Physicians and Association of Boxing Commissions annual conferences were combined this year at the Mohegan Sun Casino and Resort in Uncasville, CT. At the ARP, I presented on extreme weight cutting and the 10 point plan to address severe weight cutting in mixed martial arts. I also highlighted that the ABC Boxrec database will provide access for ringside physicians in the near future.

At the ABC meeting, Commissioner Martha Shen-Urquidez and I presented the "Mixed Martial Arts Severity Index". This is a unique formula inspired by the currently used "Boxing Severity Index" that will help regulators and matchmakers assess safer fights based on a large amount of historical data. The MMA Severity Index assigns a score to each athlete based on various criteria. The scores range from -1 to 6, with -1 fighters being the elite class of athletes while fighters 4 and over may need further evaluation.

Commissioner Martha Shen-Urquidez, Cory Schafer, Blake Grice, and I also presented the Unified Rules of Kickboxing. Commissioner Martha Shen-Urquidez and her husband Arnold Urquidez were instrumental in putting these rules together. Cory Schafer was able to get widespread industry support, and I worked to collaborate and educate other Commissions on the rules. The rules passed unanimously with one minor clarification.

I presented the 10 Point Plan to address severe weight cutting in mixed martial arts that was passed by the Commission on May 16th. As part of the 10 point plan, additional weight classes were needed to be authorized by the Association of Boxing Commissions for inclusion in the Unified Rules of Mixed Martial Arts. The weight classes of 165, 175, 195, and 225 were added to the Unified Rules of MMA by unanimous vote.

H. Update on the July 27, 2017, CSAC Stakeholder Meeting

Chairman Carvelli led a stakeholder meeting on July 27th at the Sheraton in Cerritos. Chairman Carvelli thanked everyone for coming and asked for audience participation and feedback. I provided a presentation on the 10 point plan to address severe weight cutting in mixed martial arts and addressed the 10 point scoring system and the difference between a 10-9 round and a 10-8 round in mixed martial arts. Referee John McCarthy gave a lecture on the changes to the Unified Rules of Mixed Martial Arts and scoring. Dr. Josh Kamins from UCLA BrainSport gave a presentation on Concussions in Combat Sports. Chairman Carvelli led a discussion about whether the Boxers Pension Plan should include mixed martial arts athletes.

This was one of the larger stakeholder meetings the Commission has held, and was attended by approximately 40 guests.





SHORTENED TRADE SETTLEMENT CYCLE

Effective September 5, 2017, the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) will shorten the settlement cycle from three business days to two business days for most securities transactions, including but not limited to trades for stocks, corporate and municipal bonds, mutual funds, and unit investment trusts (UITs). As a result, you will receive faster payment following the sale of a security. Additionally, you will be required to provide funds more promptly following the purchase of a security, or interest will begin accruing after settlement date if the debit has not been covered. CHANGES TO THE EQUITY COMMISSION SCHEDULE

Effective fall 2017, Raymond James will implement a new equity commission schedule in an effort to simplify our fee structure and provide greater transparency. Please talk to your financial advisor for more information about these changes.

STATEMENT OF FINANCIAL CONDITION

Securities industry regulation requires that we make available to you our Statement of Financial Condition on a semiannual basis. Included in this document is the amount of net capital that we have, as required by the Securities and Exchange Commission's Uniform Net Capital Rule.

Under that rule, the net capital for Raymond James & Associates, which is custodian for your account, must maintain the highest minimum net capital requirement of all its regulators and is the greater of \$1,000,000 or 2% of aggregate debit items arising from client transactions. Minimum capital requirements are designed to ensure we operate in the best interest of our clients.

Financial Industry Regulatory Authority ("FINRA") may require a member firm to reduce its business if its net capital is less than 4% of aggregate debit items and may prohibit a member firm from expanding its business and declaring cash dividends if its net capital is less than 5% of aggregate debit items.

As of March 31, 2017, Raymond James and Associates' net capital as a percentage of aggregate debit items was 18.14%, as compared with the minimum 2%, and net capital, as defined, was \$476,182,000, as compared with minimum required net capital of \$52,497,000, resulting in excess net-capital of \$423,685,000.

EXTENDED HOURS TRADING

Clients should consider the following items prior to engaging in extended hours trading. "Extended hours trading" means trading outside of "regular trading hours." "Regular trading hours" generally means the time between 9:30 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. Eastern Time. (Note: the official opening may be the opening cross and this often occurs after 9:30 a.m.)

- Risk of Lower Liquidity. Liquidity refers to the ability of market participants to buy and sell
 securities. Generally, the more orders that are available in a market, the greater the liquidity. Liquidity
 is important because with greater liquidity it is easier for investors to buy or sell securities, and as a
 result, investors are more likely to pay or receive a competitive price for securities purchased or sold.
 There may be lower liquidity in extended hours trading as compared to regular market hours. As a
 result, an order may only be partially executed, or not at all.
- Risk of Higher Volatility. Volatility refers to the changes in price that securities undergo when
 trading. Generally, the higher the volatility of a security, the greater its price swings. There may be
 greater volatility in extended hours trading than in regular market hours. As a result, an order may
 only be partially executed, or not at all, or an order may receive an inferior price in extended hours
 trading than it would during regular market hours.
- Risk of Changing Prices. The prices of securities traded in extended hours trading may not reflect
 the prices either at the end of regular market hours, or upon the opening the next morning. As a
 result, an order may receive an inferior price in extended hours trading than it would during regular
 market hours.
- Risk of Unlinked Markets. Depending on the extended hours trading system or the time of day, the
 prices displayed on a particular extended hours trading system may not reflect the prices in other
 concurrently operating extended hours trading systems dealing in the same securities. Accordingly,
 an order may receive an inferior price in one extended hours trading system than it would in another
 extended hours trading system.
- Risk of News Announcements. Normally, issuers make news announcements that may affect the
 price of their securities after regular market hours. Similarly, important financial information is
 frequently announced outside of regular market hours. In extended hours trading, these
 announcements may occur during trading, and if combined with lower-liquidity and higher volatility,
 may cause an exaggerated and unsustainable effect on the price of a security.
- Risk of Wider Spreads. The spread refers to the difference between the price at which a security
 can be bought and the price for which it can be sold. Lower liquidity and higher volatility in extended
 hours trading may result in wider than normal spreads for a particular security.
- Risk of Lack of Calculation or Dissemination of Underlying Index Value or Intraday Indicative
 Value ("IIV"). For certain derivative securities products, an updated underlying index value or IIV may





Re: CAMO UPDATE / DOCUMENT REQUEST

Below please find a CAMO update and report in anticipation of the CSAC meeting scheduled for August 15, 2017 in Inglewood, CA:

1. CAMO SAFETY AND SUSPENSION REPORT:

There have been no injuries of a heightened concern for the commission to review since the last CSAC meeting and report May 16, 2017.

2. FINANCIAL REPORT:

CAMO prepared and submitted a full financial report ("Full Report") in anticipation of the October 18, 2016 meeting and continues to maintain sufficient reserves as requested by CSAC. CAMO also continues to see a strong trend in new athletes and new promoters this summer season.

3. CAMO FEE REVISION 2018:

In 2013, under the direction of CSAC, CAMO made the first complete revision of all event and licensing fees since inception in 2009. As a result, CAMO decreased event fees up to 50% and some license fees by 25%. Since then, our local industry has continued to evolve and it appears that another fee revision is appropriate for the evolving industry.

Trend: The current trend in the industry is towards consolidation. Although MMA events are trending upward from last year, there are significantly fewer amateur MMA events than previous years but each individual event is larger in scale with far more fights. Ultimately, this is a positive adjustment as it provides high quality events for our athletes and more successful promotions. A consequence from this trend is fewer event license fees and increased work on a per event basis. We are in the process evaluating our proposed event and license fees for 2018 and hope to have a proposed fee and license schedule for your review and approval prior to the next CSAC meeting.

WWW.CAMO-MMA.ORG v4.0:

CAMO is approaching the launch of version 4.0 of the CAMO website that includes many new features that will improve stakeholder service and make it easier for athletes to complete the license process and for promoters and fighters to connect. However, while CAMO will enjoy the new version of its website we are already exploring new technology for version 5.0 of the website. In order to keep up with the technology curve

we need to start future development soon as the technology industry evolves at a blistering pace. CAMO is dedicated to leveraging technology to increase fighter safety and participation whenever possible. Although version 4.0 will be a great version of the CAMO website we are excited that our fifth-generation site that will take the regulation of amateur MMA to unprecedented levels in the industry.

5. ATHLETE EQUIPMENT DISTRIBUTION:

CAMO is committed to standardized gloves and equipment for all participants. CAMO offers high-quality gloves for athletes at the lowest prices in the industry to ensure athletes have access to quality equipment. For years CAMO has distributed gloves purchased by athletes at events. This distribution method has proven effective but costly and laborious. CAMO is now exploring distribution with Amazon that will allow athletes to receive their equipment within days and in some cases sooner.

6. AB 2007 COMPLIANCE:

CAMO is not a youth athletic program and does not fall under AB 2007. Nevertheless, CAMO has instituted mandatory concussion training with our officials. The Heads Up program is being used to be consistent with other organizations and has been received well and adopted into our licensing process.

7. USFL COOPERATION

CAMO and USFL are working together to share resources more than ever before. CAMO promoters are consistently working with USFL to provide venues and opportunities for youth to participate in conjunction with CAMO events. We look forward to continuing to work together to advance the sport or MMA.

In closing, we have enjoyed a great 2017 summer season. We renew our resolve to collaborate with CSAC and xecutive Officer Andy Foster to explore solutions to maximize fighter safety. Thank you for your continued support.

USA Boxing is grateful to continue as the delegated entity for amateur boxing by the California State Athletic Commission. As Executive Director, I am proud of the programs we provide to your constituents, our members throughout California.

The State of California enjoys a robust amateur boxing program. Through July 31, 2017, the collective membership in the state totals 4,562 (3,262 boxers and 1,300 coaches, officials and doctors). A detailed report broken down by LBC is enclosed. 242 club programs held 97 events, contesting over 1,800 bouts with ambulances on site for each of these events. Two athletes sustained level one concussions and must be cleared by a doctor before resuming training or competition.

USA Boxing continues to work with the Commission on the incident that occurred March 29, 2017 during the Golden Gloves boxing tournament at Lincoln Park in Los Angeles. USA Boxing concluded its investigation, providing a full report to the Commission. USA Boxing's Judicial Committee is scheduled to adjudicate the matter on September 13, 2017.

Sanctioned events within California are continually updated and posted on the USA Boxing website (www.usaboxing.org). USA Boxing appreciates the Commission's ongoing support of its youth boxing programs and congratulates California on being named host for the 2028 Olympic Games in Los Angeles!

Policies and Procedures:

USA Boxing is an organization of volunteers who, at the local level, use their homes and telephones to further the sport of amateur boxing. We love what we do, but most of us hate calls before 8 AM and after 9 PM.

- 1 The LBC has a one show per day policy with member tournaments taking precedence over shows.
- 2 If show details have not been received, then schedule information will be taken from the club's last show.
- 3 Sanctions must be submitted on-line to USA Boxing at least 10 days prior, or USA Boxing will add a \$50 late fee.
- 4 Sanctions are given out in a lottery at the LBC annual meeting in December.
- 5 When no open dates are available, registered clubs requesting sanctions will be put on a published waiting list.
- 6 Clubs are responsible for providing a doctor (MD or DO), licensed in California, to do the pre-bout and the post-bout physicals, and to be in attendance at ringside during all the bouts.
- A show must have at least five registered & certified (volunteer) officials. Sanction holder is responsible for contacting the Chief of Officials and verifying the availability of officials in their area. It is the host club's responsibility to provide a doctor, USA Boxing approved gloves, an ambulance, and encourage enough volunteer officials to come to their show.
- The JO tournament is mandated by USA Boxing and has no entrance fee. All other tournaments have an entrance fee that varies from \$3 to \$35 per boxer. Clubs usually ask for a \$5 to \$10 donation at the door at shows.
- 9 Boxers with braces must have, attached to their passbook, a <u>Release to Compete with Orthodontic</u> <u>Braces/Appliances</u> form signed by their dentist. If they are under eighteen, the form must also be signed by their parent or legal guardian.
- 10 Boxers must have a current yearly physical with a Physician's address & signature and "fit to box" indicated on form.
- 11 An ambulance is now required for all shows and tournaments per State Athletic Comm. (CSAC)
- 12 A Financial Statement for Competition is required within ten days for each show and tournament.
- 13 A travel stipend (gas money) for the volunteer officials is always appreciated.

Matchmaking is a club responsibility but will be supervised by the Chief of Officials or her designated representative.

- 1 Weigh-ins will typically be done from 9 to 10:30 AM on weekends and from 4 to 5:30 on Fridays.
- 2 Matchmaking will typically start after the weigh-ins.
- The club matchmaker will match all the host club's bouts and pre-matches that are within USA Boxing Matched Bouts (Club should not take more than half of the matches for themselves (including pre-matches) unless the show was listed on the schedule as a pre-matched show)
- 4 The host club will make matches between the clubs, making every effort to give every registered club at least one bout.
- Clubs that want all the bouts for their club must list their show on the schedule as: "All bouts will be pre-matched"
- 6 Shows are limited to 12 bouts on Friday and 20 bouts on Saturday unless approved by the Chief of Officials.
- 7 **Outdoor shows**, without a tent covering the ring, are prohibited without the express approval of the Chief of Officials.

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



SUBJECT	Agenda item #7 - Review and possible action of Petition to Change the Decision for Josh Thomson vs. Patricky Freire at the Bellator event on February 17, 2017, in San Jose, CA

BACKGROUND

This is an appeal from Josh Thomson regarding his bout with Patricky "Pitbull" Freire on February 18, 2017. This event took place at the SAP Center in San Jose, California. The Thomson vs. Pitbull match was originally scheduled to be the Co-Main event of the evening, but when Matt Mitrione had to withdraw from his scheduled bout with Fedor Emelianenko due to kidney stones, this bout became the main event. This appeal was on the May 16, 2017, CSAC Meeting Agenda and was heard by the Commission at that meeting. The Commission unanimously voted to uphold the referee's decision. Mr. Thomson has since then requested this issue be brought back to the Commission so that he can attend the meeting as he was unaware he could attend to plead his case.

APPEAL DETAIL SUMMARY

Mr. Thomson is alleging that an accidental clash of heads in the second round of the bout caused him to become disoriented which led to his knockout loss. During the second round of the bout, a clash of heads occurred quickly and was not observed by the referee, any of the three judges, or myself at ringside. Following the accidental clash of heads, Mr. Thomson quickly got up and proceeded to continue the fight. He then appears to shoot for a takedown or some other form of offensive attack, and Mr. Freire hits Mr. Thomson with a quick and short right-hand uppercut counterpunch that knocks Thomson down and leaves him unable to intelligently defend himself. Mr. Freire quickly follows up with two hammer-fists to the face and referee John McCarthy steps in and ends the contest. Because of this reason, he is asking for the bout to be ruled a no decision/no contest.

After multiple reviews of the video, we determined that an accidental clash of heads did occur, which caused Mr. Thomson to fall to the ground, but this was before he stood back up and continued the fight only to be countered with an uppercut causing the knockout.

Request for Commission Review

Bellator 172

Josh "the Punk" Thomson vs. Patricky "Pitbull" Freire

On February 18, 2017, I competed in a bout against fighter Patricky "Pitbull" Freire. In the second round, I received a head-butt which was an unintentional foul that put me in a trans state. I anticipated that the foul would be called and paused to look at the referee for direction. However, no foul was called. Immediately following the foul, I took a punch that took me to the ground which then resulted in a KO.

One issue in question is whether the foul changed the momentum of the fight that resulted in my KO.

The other issue in question is, should my fight be ruled a Technical Draw as the injury I sustained by foul allowed my opponent to win by contributing to the injury I sustained when fouled.

California Rule 4 CCR § 522 states

- (a) Fouls in kickboxing and martial arts. The following tactics are fouls in both kickboxing and martial arts and are forbidden. Use of these tactics shall result in a warning and loss of points as determined by the referee.
 - (1) Head-butts.

The Rule also states in 4 CCR § 519 "If an injury occurs due to a suspected foul that the referee was unable to see, the referee may, in his sole discretion, confer with the judges to determine where the foul may be placed. He may consider any, all, or none of the opinions expressed in making his determination. The referee may, in his sole discretion, ask for a replay, if television equipment is available, of the technique in question before rendering his decision."

Rule 4 CCR § 518§ of Unintentional Fouling states

- (a) When a bout is interrupted due to an injury caused by an unintentional foul, the referee, in consultation with the ringside physician, shall determine whether the fighter who has been fouled can continue or not. If the referee sees, or if after consultation with the judges, determines that a fighter is unintentionally fouled and if the fighter's chance of winning has not been seriously jeopardized as a result of a foul, the referee may order the bout continued after a reasonable interval, not to exceed five minutes.
- (b) If the referee and/or the ringside physician determines that the bout may not continue because of an injury suffered as the result of an unintentional foul or because of an injury inflicted by an unintentional foul which later becomes aggravated by fair blows, the bout shall be declared a draw, if according to the score cards, the bout was determined to be a draw at the time the foul occurred. If, according to the score cards, the fighter committing the foul was winning prior to the foul, the bout shall be declared a technical draw. If, according to the score cards, the fighter being fouled was winning prior to the foul, then that fighter shall be declared the winner.
- (c) When an unintentional foul causes the bout to be interrupted for the purpose of allowing the injured fighter time to recover, the referee shall penalize the fighter guilty of the foul one or more points.

According to Rule 4 CCR § 522, a head-butt is a foul. This unintentional foul should have resulted in a pause in the bout for a maximum of five minutes by Rule 4 CCR § 518§. Due to this being an injury, the referee, in consultation with the ringside physician, should have determined whether I who had been fouled could continue or not. I should have been given the maximum time to recover before resuming the bout.

If, according to the score cards, the bout was determined to be a draw at the time the foul occurred, the bout shall be declared a technical draw. If, according to the score cards, the fighter committing the foul was winning prior to the foul, the bout shall be declared a technical draw. 4 CCR § 518§

If, according to the score cards, the fighter being fouled was winning prior to the foul, then that fighter shall be declared the winner. 4 CCR § 518§(b)

This unintentional foul should have interrupted the bout allowing me to recover. After speaking with the referee of my fight and discussing the foul, I was encouraged to file my complaint. I would like to ask the Commission to review my bout and change my result to a Technical Draw.



If you failed to tune in on Facebook for the UFC on Fox 1 preliminary card bouts than you missed a very controversial stoppage in the fight between Mackens Semerzier and Robert Peralta.

The two bantamweight fighters went back and forth throughout the majority of the fight, with an edge conceivably given to Mackens for his efforts. That is until in a violent exchange of punches sent Semerzier down and we all watched his opponent Peralta capitalize with a flurry of ground strikes to earn the stoppage victory in the third frame of action.

A replay on the big screens of that last flurried exchange of stand-up action showed that it was not a punch that dropped Mackens to the canvas as originally thought, but am illegal head butt. While unintentional, head butts in Mixed Martial Arts are illegal and as a result, had the referee, in this case Big John McCarthy, noticed the infraction the bout would have still been stopped short, but it would have gone to the judges' scorecards for a decision announcement.

Today it was announced that the California State Athletic Commission did in fact rule the bout a no-contest due to the infraction of the rules and as a result, the loss that was previously on Mackens record has been removed.

Justice has been served!

Stewart's win at UFC Sao Paulo overturned due to accidental foul

Darren Stewart is going to have to wait a little longer for his first UFC win.

The Englishman appeared to make a successful debut at UFC Fight Night 100 this past Saturday when he defeated Francimar Barroso by first-round TKO. However, the Brazilian MMA Athletic Commission (CABMMA) has overturned the result to a no-contest after reviewing an accidental foul that occurred during the bout.

Footage showed that Stewart's head connected with Barroso's cheek as he pushed him against the cage, and the Brazilian fighter immediately reacted as if he was injured by the illegal headbutt. Referee Eduardo Herdy did not see Barroso's reaction and he waved the fight off shortly after as Stewart took Barroso down and finished him with ground-and-pound.

CABMMA issued a statement Tuesday via <u>Guilherme Cruz of MMA Fighting</u> that stated the foul did have a direct impact on the outcome of the bout and was only discounted because Herdy was at a disadvantageous angle to properly call the action.

CABMMA COO Cristiano Sampaio also noted in the statement that instant replay was not used properly, making it impossible to evaluate the result on fight night.

Stewart's professional record remains at 7-0, while Barroso officially avoids a second straight loss.

Brazilian athletic commission approves instant replay with help from 'Big' John McCarthy

Instant replay would have helped longtime referee "Big" John McCarthy make the correct call in a 2011 fight between Mackens Semerzier and Robbie Peralta.

After Peralta caught Semerizer with a flurry of punches at UFC on FOX 1, he was awarded a TKO victory. When arena monitors replayed the ending sequence, however, McCarthy realized an accidental headbutt had set the finish in motion.

McCarthy successfully lobbied the California State Athletic Commission (http://mmajunkie.com/2011/11/mackens-semerzier-appeals-headbutt-loss-to-robbieperalta-at-ufc-on-fox) to overturn the decision. Now, he's helping the UFC-backed Brazilian athletic commission, also known as CABMMA, put instant replay in place for future MMA events it regulates.

CABMMA announced today that McCarthy helped set guidelines for the new policy. While the tool rarely gets deployed for major events, its implementation further aligns the Brazilian commission with major Stateside commissions - among them, the Nevada State Athletic Commission - that have used it for several vears.

According to a press release, instant replay won't be available for smaller events that lack the technology to make it possible. But for major events, it will be available when it's suspected a fight ends from a foul, whether intentional or unintentional.

While a fight can't be restarted, the referee can request the sequence be replayed so he or she can make the correct decision in declaring the official results. Referees can now evaluate whether or not a fight was stopped at the right time, whether a foul brought an end to the fight, or whether a tap was missed.

"Once the referee reviews the replay, the referee can confirm (whether) or not an offense has been committed and has caused the end of the fight," the release stated. "It should be noted that the instant replay is not to be used to evaluate the actions of referee."

In the case of an accidental foul like the one seen in Semerzier vs. Peralta, the bout should have gone to the scorecards. Per the unified rules, if a accidental foul ends a bout in the third round of a non-title fight, judges score it on the first two rounds and the portion of the third round that took place. Instead, the bout was changed to a no-contest.

McCarthy has long pointed to that call as an error that could have been solved on the spot. A member of the Association of Boxing Commissions' rules and regulations committee, he and others have pushed to make instant replay a requirement for ABC member commissions.

The tool might help CABMMA from making needless mistakes. Then again, instant replay also is responsible for handing UFC interim light heavyweight champ Jon Jones his only professional loss (http://mmajunkie.com/2009/12/ufcs-jon-jones-at-peace-with-tuf-10-finale-disqualification) - via disqualification from an illegal 12-6 elbow. The rules and regulations committee is working to change that one, too.

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DECLARATION OF PATRICKY FREIRE

I. PATRICKY FREIRE. DECLARE AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. I am a mixed martial artist who resides in Parnamirim, Rio Grande do Norte, Brazil. I submit this declaration in opposition to Josh Thomson's appeal of our February 18, 2017 bout in San Jose California.
- 2. At 29 seconds of the second round. Thomson throws a left jab and a right cross which I avoid by leaning a bit to the side and ducking under but he keeps coming forward, projecting himself and his head at me. His head hits the top of my head while I was still lowering myself. That indicates he is the one committing a foul, not me. I then hit him with body punches and a glancing left hook to the temple.
- 3. Thomson breaks his own fall without any issue and keeps his eyes focused on me. He keeps himself active and even tries to land an upkick to my face. I give him space and he stands up still not showing any signs of being hurt. All the time he keeps focused on me, still in the fight like nothing happened. Thomson then shoots for a takedown, I connect an uppercut to his jaw that knocks him down and follow up with punches that knocks him out.
- 4. The fight video, which can be seen for free at Bellator's website (
 http://bellator.spike.com/fight/tvgxq8/bellator-172-josh-thomson-vs-patricky-pitbull)
 shows everything clearly, even from multiple angles. In fact, by looking at the first
 replay of the action in slow motion you can see Thomson is stepping in when he
 projects his head at mine and his back leg is still in the air. He seems to lose his step,
 which can be the reason for him falling after hitting my head with his own. The way
 he fell seems more like it happened due to a loss of balance than due to the impact of him
 hitting me. Thomson doesn't complain or makes any motion to the referee or me at
 any moment, doesn't show any moment of distraction either. He appears completely
 fine and while I looked at his eyes and expression at that moment there was nothing
 telling otherwise.
- 5. At the post fight press conference he says at the 16 minute mark of the video (https://www.voutube.com/watch?v=BTCn4HteuWe) that people came to tell him it was a pretty big headbutt and at the time he felt it but thought "ok, I can still go" and then got hit again. The fight video shows Thomson hits his head at mine while I was in the midst of lowering myself, not generating any power or resistance. I question his reasoning that it was a pretty big headbutt as well because I didn't even know that had happened until I saw the video in the locker room, I didn't feel it. I start talking about it at the 16:43 mark. If it was such a big headbutt, I would have felt it too.
- 6. I strongly disagree with Josh's statement of him being fouled. If anything, I was the one fouled. He projected his head at mine, albeit unintentionally, while rushing inside to hit me with his punches and ended up clashing with me while I was

lowering and distancing myself from him. The video is clear to show that I only start to position myself upwards after the clash.

- 7. I saw referee John McCarthy talk about a previous fight he was the referee in on which there was a headbutt involved and the result was overturned. However, that fight between Robert Peralta and Mackens Semerzier, had both fighters projecting their heads at each other and Semerzier's body going limp during his fall, with Peralta completely overwhelming him while he tried to recover (https://www.ufc.tv/video/robert-peralta-vs-mackens-semerzier-ufc-fight-night). In this situation Peralta committed a foul and Semerzier fell in a bad way, clearly rocked. A very different situation than my fight with Thomson. I repeat, even though Thomson was the one that fell afterwards, 1) Thomson was the one hitting me with a headbutt and 2) Thomson didn't show any signs of being fazed by the resulting clash.
- There have also been circumstances on which Athletic Comissions upheld results. Urijah Faber's fight against Francisco Rivera in the UFC, on which Faber hit Rivera with an eye poke and despite Rivera's complaints the referee let the fight go. Rivera ended up getting submitted, but the Nevada Comission didn't feel it impacted the result of the fight and kept it (http://www.sherdog.com/news/news/NAC-Denies-Francisco-Riveras-Appeal-to-Overturn-Loss-to-Urijah-Faber-at-UFC-181-81981). The Nevada Comission also upheld the No Contest between Alex Oliveira and Tim Means. also in the UFC, even with Means' admission that he intentionally fouled. Also in the UFC, Anthony Johnson hit Alexander Gustafsson with a headbutt right before stopping him with strikes (http://www.bloodyelbow.com/2015/1/28/792ll 303/ufc-oh-fox-alexgustafsson-vs-anthony-rumble-hohnson-headbutt-controversy) and Jussier da Silva submitted Scott Jorgensen after an accidental clash of heads knocked down Jorgensen and da Silva took his back. On the Johnson-Gustafsson fight there was no appeal, but on the Silva-Jorgensen one there was an appeal but the Commission decided the headbutt impact fight's (http://www.mmafighting.com/2014/4/4/5582864/brazilian-commission-wont-overturnjussier-formiga-vs-scott-jorgensen).
- 9. I believe it is pretty clear the situation in my fight with Thomson is much different and less harmful than any of these examples as repeatedly stated. Also, the video shows clearly it wasn't a moment of two fighters moving at each other and clashing heads, but one fighter (Thomson) projecting his head towards the other's and getting the worst of it. Therefore, I respectfully ask that the Commission uphold the fight result.

I declare under penalty of perjury that the foregoing is true and correct, and that this declaration was executed this 5th day of May, 2017, at Parnamirim, Rio Grande do Norte, Brazil.

To the Commissioners of the CSAC,

I am writing this letter in response to the request for appeal sent by Mr. Josh Thompson in regards to his February 18, 2017 fight against Patricky Pitbull Feirere. I was the referee in charge of his fight that night.

In the second round of the fight there was an exchange that took place while I was standing to the left rear of Josh Thompson. Josh moved forward at the same time as Pitbull and I observed Pitbull throw a left hook, which looked as if it landed to the right side of Josh Thompson's head. I observed Josh starting to fall backwards, but also observed him reaching his right hand out to brace his fall, which told me that he was still functioning and able to control his physical movements. I did think at the time that there was a possibility that both fighters' heads had come together in an unintentional clash of heads, but I did not see the actual contact. At this time Josh Thompson used good technical skill to get himself back up to a standing position and attempted to change levels as if shooting for a takedown on Pitbull. I observed Pitbull throw a quick right uppercut, which landed cleanly to the left side of Josh Thompson's face. I observed Josh drop to the ground, not being able to control his fall. Pitbull quickly came after Josh and landed two hammerfist to Josh before I stopped the fight.

After ending the fight I went to the judge closest to the action that had just occurred and asked him if the first knockdown was due to a clash of heads or the left hand. He told me that it was the left hand that caused the knockdown. I went over to the commission table and called the fight a KO giving the table the time ending the fight. Upon watch a replay of the fight I can see that the first knockdown was caused by both fighters coming together and Pitbull's head coming in contact with the right cheek area of Josh Thompson. I can understand why the judge I polled said the left hand caused the knockdown, however it is clear that the unintentional clash of the heads had more to do with the knockdown than did the left hand.

The real question here is how hurt was Josh Thompson due to the unintentional clash of heads. This type of activity happens frequently in MMA, but many times the fighters just continue with the action of the fight. Only Josh knows how much the clash affected him. It is clear when you watch a replay of the fight that Josh quickly and skillfully gets himself back to his feet from the knockdown and that the blow, which brought an end to the fight, was completely legal. It should be noted that when Josh was fully back and functioning after the KO he came to me and said "Damn John I got headbutted"

BACKGROUND

California Code of Regulations Section 711 states that amateur kickboxing contestants under the age of 18 <u>may</u> wear headgear. The proposal changes the language to <u>require</u> all amateur contestants under the age of 18 to wear headgear. This request comes as a recommendation from the Chief Consultant of the California State Assembly, Committee on Arts, Entertainment, Sports, Tourism and Internet Media, due to concern of concussions for amateur athletes.

RECOMMENDATION

I recommend the Commission approve the proposed changes to Section 711, of Article 2, of Division 2, of Title 4 of the California Code of Regulations "Headgear" language and authorize Commission staff to proceed with the rulemaking process.

I make this recommendation to further the Commission's mission of health, safety, protection of athletes, and the public.

§ 711. Headgear; Under 18.

In addition to that equipment required in Section 513 and 710 of these regulations, every contestant in the Open Class who is under 18 years of age mayshall wear a headgear that is approved by the Amateur Boxing Federation or an equivalent organization during a contest or match.

Note: Authority cited: Section 18763, Business and Professions Code. Reference: Sections 18640 and 18766, Business and Professions Code.

BACKGROUND

On August 12, 2016, the Commission submitted to the Office of Administrative Law, proposed changes to section 280, of Division 2, of Title 4 of the California Code of Regulations regarding specific medical examination procedures including an additional Neurological Examination Assessment.

Pursuant to the Administrative Procedure Act, the Commission has one year to complete the rulemaking process on proposed language. The Commission completed all procedural requirements and submitted a complete rulemaking file to the Department of Consumer Affairs for review and approval on November 16, 2016. Shortly after, the Commission staff recommended significant changes to the neurological assessment section 280 (h) of the proposed language. These proposed changes are a result of our recent experiences with the implementation of the C3 Logix Program, as well as the change in the Commission's appropriation of the Neurological Fund.

On March 14, 2017, the Commission approved to withdraw the proposed regulation file Z-2016-0801-04, "Examination of Boxer Applicants" to allow additional time to prepare and propose a new rulemaking file.

Commission staff drafted language to section 280 to appropriately reflect the correct Neurological Assessment that is to be collected.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

The Executive Officer recommends approving the proposed changes to section 280, of Article 6, of Division 2, of Title 4 of the California Code of Regulations regarding medical examination procedures including an additional Neurological Examination Assessment and authorizing Commission staff to proceed with the rulemaking process.

CALIFORNIA STATE ATHLETIC COMMISSION

PROPOSED TEXT

§ 280. Examination Of Boxer Applicants.

- (a) Any boxer applying for a license or renewal thereof shall be examined by a physician currently licensed by this state to establish both physical and mental fitness for competition. Such examination shall be taken at such time as directed by the commission. Any boxer licensed by the commission who participates in a boxing match or contest outside the State of California may be required, upon his return to California, to again take this examination before being allowed to box in California. The results of such contests shall be reported to the nearest commission office by the licensee within 72 hours of his return to California.
- (b) An examination of an applicant or licensee may be accepted by the commission if it is performed by a physician authorized to perform such examinations by the state or nation in which the examination is conducted and if it is conducted in accordance with commission instructions, including the use of applicable forms prescribed by the commission.
- (c) Any boxer applying for a license or renewal shall be required to submit to and complete a medical examination process, which shall include the following:
 - 1. Neurological Examination must be performed by a licensed physician that specializes in neurology or neurosurgery. This examination is valid for 12 months.
 - 2. Magnetic Resonance Imaging (MRI) using standard brain protocol to include Gradient Echo Imaging (GRE) or Susceptibility Weighted Imaging (SWI), shall be interpreted by a licensed neurologist, neurosurgeon, or neuroradiologist, every 36 months.
 - 3. Electrocardiogram (EKG) must be performed by a licensed physician. This medical test is only required once, or at the discretion of the licensed examining physician or the commission.
 - 4. Physical Examination must be performed by a licensed physician and is valid for 12 months.
 - 5. Eye Examination must be performed by a licensed ophthalmologist and must meet the requirements set forth in Section 282, Article 6 of the California Code of Regulations. This examination is valid for 12 months.
 - 6. The following required blood tests shall be taken within 30 days prior to the date of application and are valid for 6 months:

- (A) Human Immunodeficiency Virus (HIV) Antibody
- (B) Hepatitis B Surface Antigen (HBsAg)
- (C) Hepatitis C Virus (HCV) Antibody
- (d) The laboratory that administered the required blood tests shall be a laboratory in the United States that possesses a certificate under the Clinical Laboratory Improvement Act (42 U.S.C. Sec. 263a). The results of each blood test shall indicate that all required tests are negative and shall be submitted to the commission on the letterhead of the laboratory that administered them.
- (e) The examining physician may recommend or require any additional tests or evaluations he or she deems necessary, as specified in Business and Professions Code section 18711. If additional tests or evaluations are required the athlete has the ability to appeal to the medical advisory committee.
- (f) The commission may require additional neurological diagnostic testing to provide concussion management and may use these diagnostics to determine the appropriate time for return to competition or retirement from competition in combat sports.
- (g) The commission may waive the requirement for a brain imaging scan or an EKG if a brain imaging scan or EKG was completed as part of the licensing requirements in another state, as specified in Business and Professions Code section 18711.
- (h) The commission may, in its discretion, accept tests or evaluations that are equivalent to those described in subdivision (c) and that have been completed within one year of licensure.
- (i) In accordance with section 18711 of the Business and Professions Code, the commission shall collect one quarter of 1 percent of gross ticket sales, from each licensed promoter of professional matches, per event sanctioned by the commission. If the State Athletic Commission Neurological Examination Account balance falls below one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000), the amount of the assessment shall be re-examined by the commission. The manner in which the assessment is collected shall be at the discretion of the commission and shall be deposited in and credited to the State Athletic Commission Neurological Examination Account and shall be used to pay for the costs of neurological examinations required by section 18711.

NOTE: Authority cited: Section 18611, Business and Professions Code.

SUBJECT MATTER OF PROPOSED REGULATIONS:

Examination of Boxer Applicants

SECTIONS AFFECTED: Amend Title 4 California Code of Regulations as follows:

Amend Sections 280 (Physical Examinations and Safety)

SPECIFIC PURPOSE

Following is a description of each proposed amendment and the factual basis for the action.

- 1. Add section 280 (c) (g): Per Business and Professions Code section 18711, on or after January 1, 2008, all professional athletes licensed under this chapter are required by the commission to complete medical examinations, to be determined by the commission through regulations, as a condition of initial licensure and license renewal. The medical examinations detect physical conditions that could place an athlete or contestant at risk for serious injury or permanent or temporary impairment of any bodily function. The proposed amendments provide that these tests or examinations shall include, but not be limited to, a Neurological Examination, a Magnetic Resonance Imaging (MRI), a Electrocardiogram (EKG), a Physical Examination, an Eye Examination, and blood tests for Human Immunodeficiency Virus (HIV) Antibody, Hepatitis B Surface Antigen, Hepatitis C Virus and Tuberculosis. The specifics for each test and factual basis for the action:
 - 1. Neurological Examination must be performed by a licensed physician that specializes in neurology or neurosurgery. This examination is valid for 12 months.

<u>Factual Basis:</u> This is a requirement specified in Business and Professions Code section 18711. This examination is crucial to detect neurological abnormalities and is required every 12 months or sooner if needed by the commission.

2. Magnetic Resonance Imaging (MRI) using standard brain protocol to include Gradient Echo Imaging (GRE) or Susceptibility Weighted Imaging (SVVI), shall be interpreted by a licensed neurologist, neurosurgeon, or neuroradiologist, every 36 months.

<u>Factual Basis:</u> The MRI has superior sensitivity to computed tomography (CT) for identification of hemorrhagic axonal injury, small contusions, and small extra-

axial collections.

Susceptibility-weighted MRI imaging (SWI) is very sensitive for the detection of blood products and, in particular, micro bleeds. ¹

Clinical practitioners with training and expertise in Neurology, Neurosurgery, and/or Neuroradiology are generally most familiar and skilled in evaluation and clinical interpretation of brain imaging.

3. Electrocardiogram (EKG) must be performed by a licensed physician. This medical test is only required once, or at the discretion of the licensed examining physician.

<u>Factual Basis:</u> EKG (electrocardiogram) is a diagnostic test of electrical activity in the heart. An initial test establishes presence or absence of potentially dangerous abnormality (ex. hypertrophic cardiomyopathy) that might warrant further evaluation or result in prohibition from licensed participation due to concerns for sudden cardiac death. ²

One EKG also establishes a "baseline" with which comparisons can be made at a later date (at the discretion of the examining physician).

There is little value in routine screening in individuals without symptoms and the possibility of "false positives" may lead to un-necessary testing that also carries risk. ³

4. Physical Examination must be performed by a licensed physician and is valid for 12 months.

<u>Factual Basis:</u> Pre-participation physical examinations provide for assessment and detection of underlying medical problems that may limit competition or place an individual at increased risk as a result of participation. In addition, an evaluation for any physical deficiencies involving musculoskeletal or neurological dysfunction as a result of injury (or otherwise) placing the athlete at increased risk can be made.

The overwhelming majority of organized youth, high school, collegiate, and professional sports organizations and/or governing bodies require a Pre-Participation Examination (PPE) prior to each season and/or at the time of any graduation to the next level of participation. In the absence of traditional calendar-based "season" to inform timing of PPE, a yearly examination is required (every 12 months).

5. Eye Examination must be performed by a licensed ophthalmologist and must meet the requirements set forth in Section 282, Article 6 of the California Code of Regulations. This examination is valid for 12 months.

Factual Basis: A higher bar is required for recognizing trauma, its implications and the remedies needed for visual rehabilitation. Ophthalmologists are more highly trained in disease and pathology recognition than Optometrists, and specifically trained to manage and treat trauma, diseases and their complications, including surgery, if required. Only someone with this level of training and experience can be given the responsibility of assuring the health of our athlete's eyes; just as a physician's assistant cannot substitute for a medical doctor.

Obtaining an eye examination is already a requirement for licensure in California Code of Regulations section 282, Article 6. The purpose of adding this again here is for clarity of having all medical requirements in one section.

- 6. The following required blood tests shall be taken within 30 days of the date of application and are valid for 6 months:
 - (A) Human Immunodeficiency Virus (HIV) Antibody
 - (B) Hepatitis B Surface Antigen (HBsAg)
 - (C) Hepatitis C Virus (HCV)

<u>Factual Basis:</u> Combat sports frequently result in mutual exposure to blood during competition and as such, Blood Borne Pathogens such as Hepatitis B, Hepatitis C, and HIV are spread through sexual contact, exposure to blood and blood products, contamination of open wounds or mucous membranes by infected blood and as such may be transmitted during an event. ^{4 5}

Transmission risk varies based on the "infectiveness" of the viral organism. No specific data is available specific to combat sports, but data from accidental needle stick exposure to Blood Borne Pathogens indicates Hepatitis B more easily transmitted than Hepatitis C, both of which are more easily transmitted than HIV. There are reported cases of HIV and Hepatitis transmission from bloody fights ⁶ ⁷ and combat sports respectively. ⁸

2. Add Section 280 (h) to read: "In accordance with section 18711 of the Business and Professions Code, the commission shall collect one quarter of 1 percent of gross ticket sales, from each licensed promoter of professional matches, per event sanctioned by the commission. If the State Athletic Commission Neurological Examination Account balance falls below one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000), the amount of the

assessment shall be re-examined by the commission. The manner in which the assessment is collected shall be at the discretion of the commission and shall be deposited in and credited to the State Athletic Commission Neurological Examination Account and shall be used to pay for the costs of neurological examinations required by section 18711."

State law requires the Commission to administer the Neurological Examination Account, which the Legislature established in 1986 to pay for athletes' neurological examinations; however, according to the Bureau of State Audits, the Commission has not effectively managed this account. The State Auditor report 2012-117 stated the Commission has not used the neurological account to pay for any neurological examinations since at least 1998. The Commission did not properly administer the Neurological Examination Account due to a lack of regulations. This proposal would provide the necessary regulations to properly administer the account in accordance with the law.

As stated in the Bureau of State Audit Report (BSA) 2012-117:

"The commission has also failed to adequately administer its Neurological Examination Account (neurological account), which the Legislature established in 1986 to pay for neurological examinations that might detect physical conditions that could place athletes at risk for serious or permanent injury. Although the fund balance in the neurological account reached \$712,000 as of June 30, 2012, the commission has not used the account to pay for examinations since at least 1998, stating that it could not do so because of the excessive cost of the examinations. Instead, it has used the neurological account only to pay for state operations, such as a portion of the salary and benefits of the staff person who is responsible for verifying the accuracy of the neurological assessment calculation. The commission is considering requesting legislation that would change its responsibilities related to paying for these examinations. However, until the Legislature makes such a change, the commission is failing to use the funds to fulfill the intent of the law."

It is clear that the intent of Section 18711 of the Business and Professions Code (BPC) is to provide the most up-to-date and thorough neurological care for combatant sports athletes licensed in our state. Pursuant to BPC Section 18711, the Commission shall require, as a condition of licensure and as a part of the application process, the examination by a licensed physician and surgeon who specializes in neurology and neurosurgery of each applicant for a license as a professional athlete. The law requires athletes to receive these examinations in order to detect physical conditions that could place them at risk for serious injury. The Legislature established the Neurological Examination Account on January 1, 1986 with the intended purpose of paying for these neurological examinations, which could represent a considerable cost to athletes.

The specific purpose of this amendment to Section 280 is to establish the necessary and specific regulations and establish a neurological assessment fee and carry out the Legislative intent of BPC 18711. This regulatory proposal establishes a neurological assessment fee of one quarter of 1 percent of gross ticket sales paid by promoters on a per event basis. According to a recent analysis conducted by Commission staff, a one quarter of 1 percent fee per event would be sufficient to adequately fund the Neurological Examination Account and pay for professional athlete neurological examinations as required by BPC 18711. In addition, this regulatory proposal would

limit the expenditures from the Neurological Examination Account to pay for the costs of neurological examinations required by BPC Section 18711 or for any other purpose related to the neurological health of combat sports athletes and authorized by the State Athletic Commission Act.

FACTUAL BASIS/RATIONALE:

In order to implement the Legislative intent of BPC Section 18711, this regulatory proposal will set the neurological assessment fee at one quarter of 1 percent of gross ticket sales per event, and will require the Commission to re-examine the amount of the assessment when the Neurological Account balance falls below \$100,000. The threshold of \$100,000 is proposed because it will allow the commission to cover the costs of Neurological Examinations required as a condition of licensure for approximately one year, which is also the average timeframe to promulgate regulations to amend the assessment amount.

This proposal is based on estimated costs of approximately \$77,000 per year to pay for athlete neurological testing. The Commission estimates the annual revenue the Neurological Examination Account would receive at \$33,287 based on an approximate number of gross ticket sales of all events held in 2016. The commission estimates the annual expenditures of \$77,000 based on an existing contract in place for Neurological Testing at \$23,000, Inspector costs associated with administering the Neurological Testing at \$39,000, Inspector travel costs at \$5,000, and the Department and Statewide Pro Rata from the Neurological Examination Account of approximately \$10,000, totaling \$77,000 annually.

The Commission assumes 140 events each year based on historical information. As a result, if the neurological assessment was one quarter of 1 percent, the Neurological Examination Account balance would slowly decrease over the next ten years to approximately \$140,000 by FY 25/26. Because the Neurological Examination Account currently has a significant fund balance of approximately \$580,000, the Commission believes it should charge an assessment that will begin to draw down the fund balance slowly and prudently over time. The Commission will re-evaluate the fee amount and adjust if necessary to ensure the lowest possible burden on our promoters while ensuring a stable funding source for the Neurological Examination Account.

FISCAL IMPACT ANALYSIS

Athletes applying for licensure are already being directed to complete the medical examinations that are proposed (as authorized by CCR 280). The Commission does not anticipate a major fiscal impact as these examinations are already a requirement for licensure. In addition, most costs associated with these medical examinations are paid by the Promoters.

Currently, the Commission charges promoters a neurological assessment of \$.01 cent per exempt ticket and per ticket sold at each event. This proposal would require promoters to pay one quarter of 1 percent of gross ticket sales.

ECONOMIC IMPACT ANALYSIS/ASSESSMENT

The Commission does not expect a significant economic impact to Promoters as most are already paying the costs associated with the Neurological Examination and other medical requirements as a condition of licensure.

This regulatory proposal will have the following effects:

- It will not create or eliminate jobs within the State of California because the Commission is only covering the costs associated with the Neurological Examination that is required as a condition of licensure.
- It will not create new business or eliminate existing businesses within the State of California because this proposal still requires the same medical documentation as a condition of licensure.
- It will not affect the expansion of businesses currently doing business within the State of California because this proposal still requires the same medical documentation as a condition of licensure.
- This regulatory proposal does not affect worker safety because this proposal is not relative to worker safety.
- This regulatory proposal does not affect the state's environment because this
 proposal is not relevant to the state's environment.

BUSINESS IMPACT

The regulations will not have a significant adverse economic impact on promoters that promote professional boxing and mixed martial arts events in California. Promoters currently pay for many of the medical tests necessary when a professional athlete fights in California. Among the many things promoters often pay for are the athlete

neurological examinations. California requires athlete neurological examinations for
professional athletes every 15 months (will change to 12 months with this proposal).
Promoters and/or their athletes must pay for these exams out of their own pockets on
an as needed basis. The business/financial impact to our promoters should be minimal.
Promoters currently pay an average of to the Neurological Fund Account.
This proposal will change this amount to an average of \$238 per event, based on
historical data of gross ticket sales.

SPECIFIC TECHNOLOGIES OR EQUIPMENT


The regulatory proposal does not require the use of any new specific technologies or equipment. The Commission requires neurological examination to be performed by a physician authorized to perform such examinations. The regulatory proposal only changes the method in which the examinations are paid for. This proposal will not require new equipment or technology for the physicians providing neurological examination services.

CONSIDERATION OF ALTERNATIVES

No reasonable alternative to the regulation would be either more effective in carrying out the purpose for which the action is proposed or would be as effective and less burdensome to affected private persons than the proposed regulation or would be more cost effective to affected private persons and equally effective in implementing the statutory requirement or other provision of law.
