

OPEN SESSION

Agenda Item 1 – Call the meeting to Order / Roll Call / Establishment of Quorum

The meeting was called to order at 10:00 a.m. by Chair Peter Villegas. Executive Officer (EO) Andy Foster called roll and a guorum was established.

Agenda Item 2 – Chairman's Opening Remarks

Chair Villegas offered thoughts and prayers to the family of Commissioner Hardeman's family. Chair Villegas noted the many accomplishments of Commissioner Hardeman and called for a moment of silence to honor him.

Agenda Item 3- Review and possible action to approve October 24, 2022 Commission meeting minutes

Chair Villegas presented the October 24, 2022 Commission meeting minutes for approval.

Commissioner Gruwell moved to approve the October 24, 2022 meeting minutes.

Vice Chair Dr. Williams seconded the motion.

No Commission or public comments

The motion passed 5-0 by roll call vote.

Agenda Item 4- Discussion and possible action for a meal per diem and mileage pay increase for Officials and a review of the Officials pay scale

EO Foster presented the proposed \$46 increase for meal per diem for officials. He explained that the cost of eating out has gone up and the per diem increase would acceptable and be in line with what the state allows.

Commissioner Gruwell *moved* to approve the meal per diem increase to \$46.

Commissioner Dr. DeMars *seconded* the motion.

No Commission or public comments

The motion passed 5-0 by roll call vote.

Agenda Item 5- Discussion and possible action to approve the Commission's 2023 Rulemaking Calendar

EO Foster presented the 2023 Rulemaking Calendar that is required by the Office of Administrative Law. He explained that there are currently a few rulemaking packages the Commission is working on, including the Boxers Pension Plan Requirements and the Dehydration Rehydration package. EO Foster recommended the Commission give notice to the public of the projected dates on the calendar.

Commissioner Hendrickson moved to approve the Rulemaking Calendar.

Vice Chair Dr. Williams seconded the motion.

Agenda Item 7 – Pursuant to Government Code Section 11126(a)(1) the Commission conducted an annual review of the Executive Officer

OPEN SESSION

Agenda Item 8 – Review and discussion of the boxing statistical report provided by BoxRec

EO Foster explained that BoxRec is helping compile data to enable the Commission to measure how it is performing but is not yet finished. EO Foster presented the data that was available, explaining that the Commission is still below the number of events it had pre-COVID, but that it is still had the most out of all the state Commissions. He presented a graph of the Boxers Boxing Severity Index (BSI) for fights held in California and explained how the BSI is a tool for bout approvals that helps him track boxer activity and performance.. Commissioner Dr. DeMars stated that it's helpful to be able to show the public that the EO's decisions have objective criteria behind them. EO Foster provided an example of a boxer that was retired by the Commission based on his performance and BSI rating.

No further Commission comments or public comments

Agenda Item 9 – Review and discussion of the mix martial arts statistical report provided by the Combat Registry

EO Foster explained how his use of the BSI led to him creating the MMA Severity Index (MMASI) with help from statisticians, former officials, and the MMA Database record keeper. He explained how the MMA Database provided data for over sixty thousand MMA bouts which allowed them to select the best version of the MMASI.

Commissioner Dr. DeMars asked about information regarding concussion data and sharing that with the public. EO Foster explained that he and Vice Chair Dr. Williams were speaking to Rose Gracie about concussion data and that he was waiting for Vice Chair Dr. Williams to review and approve the information before making it public.

Vice Chair Dr. Williams explained how challenging it has been to educate the public on concussions and how the data suggests that, despite providing information to the public, it has not altered athletes' and coaches' behavior regarding concussion injury. Vice Chair Dr. Williams wants to ensure that any information the Commission provides is as accurate as possible.

No Commission or Public Comments

Agenda Item 10 – Executive Officer's Report

a. Budget update for the support fund, the neurological fund, and the pension program

EO Foster stated that the Commission will already have revenue deposits of over a million dollars in the 2022-23 fiscal year. EO Foster estimated revenue will be about \$1,050,000 by the end of the first half of the fiscal year and if that is the case the Commission will be ahead of revenue projections for this fiscal year.

b. Report on the pending and proposed regulations

EO Foster explained there are currently two regulation packages being processed:

- Dehydration and rehydration regulation would allow the Commission to cancel any bout in which a fighter has weighed in on event day 15% over what they weighed on weigh-in day. EO Foster predicts few if any fights will be canceled due to the regulation because it will force matchmakers and promoters to adjust matches and bout contracts according to the appropriate weight.
- Pension Plan regulation is still being worked on to include other items and to remove the break in service requirement.

Chair Villegas complemented the leadership of the Commission on their innovation and working on regulations other states have not yet considered. California State Athletic Commission Meeting Minutes December 12, 2022 Page 5 of 7

c. Status update of delegated entities

• California Amateur Mixed Martial Arts Organization (CAMO)

JT Steele, President of CAMO, submitted his written report to the Commission, which is contained in the meeting materials. Mr. Steele explained how CAMO plans to use Herb Dean's inspector certification course at the amateur level to allow inspectors a better pathway to become inspectors with the Commission. Mr. Steele explained the training course will not be mandatory but will allow prospective inspectors more education beyond on the job training and shadowing.

Mr. Steele stated the officials pay scale increase will take effect January 1, 2023.

• USA Boxing

Mr. Mike McAtee, Executive Director of USA Boxing, submitted his written report to the Commission which is contained in the meeting materials. Mr. McAtee explained that USA Boxing updates were late due to an employee leaving. They will be submitting an amendment to the report before the next meeting.

USA Boxing just finished their National Championships in Lubbock, TX. California had the second most participants with 14% of 840 total boxers. Mr. McAtee noted that 25% of participants were female which was up from 20% in previous years. Mr. McAtee also noted that out of 422 bouts in all 6 days of the Championships they had less than 1 knockout and credited that to EO Foster's suggestion of using minimum win percentages in addition to a minimum bout requirement. Mr. McAtee explained that using the Boxing Severity Index worked to increase the competition level and increase the health and safety of the athletes.

Mr. McAtee introduced the new board members joining USA Boxing in 2023. He also explained that USA Boxing received a \$25,000 grant for the Grant for Gyms program and awarded 50 gyms grant money. Mr. McAtee noted that the Southern California market requested a \$2 increase to annual license fees for officials and boxers. He explained this money stays within California to help run the local boxing clubs. Mr. McAtee highlighted the Junior High Performance Camp USA Boxing held in Chula Vista and the regional training facility they are working on developing.

Commissioner Dr. DeMars asked what the Grants for Gyms provides money for. Mr. McAtee explained that the Grant provides gyms with money to pay for various membership fees as well as equipment and apparel for the fighters. • United States Fight League (USFL)

Jon Frank of the USFL submitted his written report to the Commission, which is contained in the meeting materials. Mr. Frank informed the Commission that the USFL had 6 events since the last meeting but have been combining shows with CAMO. Mr. Frank explained that all of their officials are also CAMO officials, but they decided to have one dedicated referee that works on the youth bouts due to the differing rules in both sports. Mr. Frank noted that there have been no injuries in the events they held since the last meeting. Mr. Frank explained that the USFL is moving forward with working with Cedars-Sinai Kerlan-Jobe Institute on their study of the benefits versus the risks for youth in this sport. Mr. Frank would like to add a baseline concussion testing like Impact or C3 Logix. Mr. Frank noted that the Kravis Leadership Institute is nearly complete and ready to roll out. Mr. Frank also noted that the USFL plans to reinitiate their USFL Champion Ring program which would require fighters that participate in a certain number of fights. They would have to participate in the leadership program and the study to obtain the championship ring.

Mr. Frank highlighted their seventh former youth fighter, Raul Rosas Jr., who made it to the UFC. He also mentioned the 9 California athletes that qualified for the US National Team at the UFC Performance Institute Selection Camp being held in November.

International Kickboxing Federation (IKF)

Toni Fossum of IKF submitted her written report to the Commission, which is contained in the meeting materials. Mrs. Fossum presented IKF's report to the Commission, explaining that they held 12 events from October 1st to December 4th. Mrs. Fossum noted that IKF sanctioned 79 female bouts in 2022, with 12 being championship bouts. Mrs. Fossum also noted the very first Promoters Zoom call held by IKF where they discussed issues and ideas. The IKF plans to hold these Zoom meetings biannually. Mrs. Fossum explained the IKF opened registration for their Steve Fossum Memorial IKF West Coast Classic. Mrs. Fossum explained IKF has been allowing for online registration for fighters and will be working on setting-up online payments in California in 2023. Mrs. Fossum explained that IKF will not be increasing their sanctioning fees in 2023 and will instead focus on increasing officials pay starting January 1st.

Mrs. Fossum noted that IKF sanctioned 649 bouts in 2022 and only had 5 medical transports, none being serious.

Mrs. Fossum stated that IKF will be holding training courses for officials next year with the first being held in January.

Chair Villegas suggested that Mrs. Fossum reach out to other sports associations that are facing challenges recruiting officials to promote opportunities for officials and inspectors.

d. Staffing Update

EO Foster noted that the Commission has now hired Sean Wells as the Assistant Chief Athletic Inspector. The Commission office now currently has 6 employees, 4 in the Sacramento office and 2 working remotely. There are currently vacancies, but EO Foster explained he is waiting on the budget to be more transparent before those are filled.

e. Upcoming Event Schedule

EO Foster pointed out that the first event to be held on network TV in about 10 years will be Bellator 290 in Inglewood on February 4, 2023. EO Foster noted that more promoters and events are televising their events.



BACKGROUND

On January 24, 2023, the Commission received a petition to change a decision from Kai Amdur on behalf of Iman Williams. The bout occurred at the Commerce Casino in Commerce on January 21, 2023 and ended in a split decision after four scheduled rounds.

During the fourth round, fighter Iman Williams received a blow that caused him to take a knee. Referee Ivan Guillermo sent fighter Cashton Young to the neutral corner and proceeded to perform the 8-count. Mr. Williams stood at the count of 4 and notified Mr. Guillermo that he was able to continue. The bout went on and ended after the scheduled four rounds. The judges scored the bout 38-37 (Williams), 37-38 (Young), and 37-38 (Young), ruling it a split decision.

APPEAL DETAIL SUMMARY

Mr. Amdur, on behalf of Mr. Williams, alleges that during the fourth round, Mr. Williams received a low blow which caused him to take a knee. This was ruled a knockdown by Referee Guillermo. Mr. Amdur claims that this missed call caused the judges to score the round 10-8 in favor of Mr. Young leading to the split decision and Mr. Williams' loss. Mr. Amdur requests that the Commission review the events of this bout and reverse the split decision ruling.

EO RECOMMENDATION

I believe that the Commission referee I assigned to this bout made a critical error during the fourth round of this bout. After watching the video, it is clear that there was a low blow punch that caused Mr. Williams to stop and take a knee. Referee Ivan Guillermo missed that foul and mistakenly ruled it a knockdown. Because the loss attributed to Mr. Williams was due to referee error, I recommend changing this bout to a no-contest.

California Code of Regulations Article 8

§ 368. Change of Decision.

(a) A decision rendered at the termination of any boxing contest is final and shall not be changed unless following the rendition of a decision the commission determines that any one of the following occurred:

(1) There was collusion affecting the result of any contest.

(2) The compilation of the scorecard of the judges, and the referee when used as a judge, shows an error which would mean that the decision was given to the wrong boxer.

(3) There was a violation of the laws or rules and regulations governing boxing which affected the result of any contest.

(4) The winner of a bout tested positive immediately after the bout for a substance listed in Rule 303(c).

(b) A petition to change a decision shall be in writing and fled by a boxer or the boxer's manager within five (5) calendar days from the date the decision was rendered.

(c) If a petition to change a decision is not fled in writing within five (5) days of the decision, the commission may, upon the vote of at least a majority of the commissioners present, hold a hearing to change the decision at any time.

(d) If the commission determines that any of the above occurred with regards to any contest then the decision rendered shall be changed as the commission may direct.







BACKGROUND

On October 27, 2022, the Commission received a petition to change a decision from fighter Matthew Hampton. The bout occurred at the Commerce Casino in Commerce on October 22, 2022 and ended in a unanimous decision after three scheduled rounds.

At the beginning of round 3, fighter Kallum Parker is grappling Mr. Hampton, with Mr. Hampton's back against the cage. At around 4:11 left on the clock, Mr. Parker appears to have grabbed the cage behind Mr. Hampton. At 4:01 minutes left, the camera view changes and shows Mr. Parker grabbing the cage with his left hand. He then releases the cage. At about 3:43 left in the round, Mr. Hampton looks to Referee Milan Ayers. At 3:39 left in the round Referee Ayers stops the fight to move the fighters away from the cage. The bout continues and at about 2:22 left in the round Mr. Parker forces Mr. Hampton back to the cage. At 1:51, Mr. Hampton picks Mr. Parker attempting a takedown and Referee Ayers instructs Mr. Parker not to grab the cage. Referee Ayers stops the fight at 1:47 left in the round to issue a warning to Mr. Parker. The fight continues to the end of the third round. The bout ended after three scheduled rounds and was scored 28-29 (Parker),28-29 (Parker), and 28-29 (Parker) ruling it a unanimous decision.

APPEAL DETAIL SUMMARY

Mr. Hampton alleges that during round 3 of the bout, his opponent, Kallum Parker, committed a foul by grabbing onto the cage fencing on three occasions to keep position or prevent a takedown. Mr. Hampton claims the first instance occurred with 4:11 remaining in the round (49 seconds into round 3), where Mr. Parker grabs onto the cage with his left hand for about 20 seconds. The second instance allegedly occurred with 3:43 remaining on the clock (1:17 into round 3), where Mr. Hampton notified referee Mr. Ayers that Mr. Parker is grabbing onto the cage. The third occurrence is at 1:51 minutes remaining (3:09 into round 3) where Mr. Parker allegedly holds onto the cage to prevent a takedown

Mr. Hampton claims that had Referee Ayers caught these fouls and issued a point deduction, or if the takedown was allowed to happen the result of the fight would have been different.

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

Attached for your review are written statements from Referee Milan Ayers and Fighter Kallum Parker.

California Code of Regulations Article 8

§ 368. Change of Decision.

(a) A decision rendered at the termination of any boxing contest is final and shall not be changed unless following the rendition of a decision the commission determines that any one of the following occurred:

(1) There was collusion affecting the result of any contest.

(2) The compilation of the scorecard of the judges, and the referee when used as a judge, shows an error which would mean that the decision was given to the wrong boxer.

(3) There was a violation of the laws or rules and regulations governing boxing which affected the result of any contest.

(4) The winner of a bout tested positive immediately after the bout for a substance listed in Rule 303(c).

(b) A petition to change a decision shall be in writing and fled by a boxer or the boxer's manager within five (5) calendar days from the date the decision was rendered.

(c) If a petition to change a decision is not fled in writing within five (5) days of the decision, the commission may, upon the vote of at least a majority of the commissioners present, hold a hearing to change the decision at any time.

(d) If the commission determines that any of the above occurred with regards to any contest then the decision rendered shall be changed as the commission may direct.



ASSOCIATION OF BOXING COMMISSIONS AND COMBATIVE SPORTS UNIFIED RULES OF MIXED MARTIAL ARTS

AS APPROVED APRIL 2001. AMENDED 2010. AMENDED AUGUST 3, 2016. AMENDED WITH PROCEDURES JULY 26, 2017. AMENDED WITH PROCEDURES AUGUST 1, 2018. AMENED WITH PROCEDURE AUGUST 1, 2019. AMENDED WITH PROCEDURE JULY 26, 2022.

Note: These are the Official Unified Rules of MMA. Any other form of these rules may not be called the "Unified Rules of MMA" and shall be referred to by the name of the commission sanctioning the/an event.

1. Each round shall consist of a five (5) minute duration (professional), with a one (1) minute rest period between rounds.

a. No contests shall exceed five (5) rounds and/or twenty-five (25) minutes.

b. Bouts may consist of one (1), two (2), three (3), four (4), or five (5) rounds, with a five (5) minute duration.

c. No contestant shall exceed competing more than five (5) rounds and/or twenty-five (25) minutes of fighting in a twenty-four (24) hour period.

2. The referee is the sole arbiter of a bout and is the only individual authorized to stop a contest. This shall not preclude a video or other review of a decision under the procedure of the applicable regulatory authority if a protest is filed claiming a clear rule violation.

a. The authority of a referee begins when the inspector(s) exit the cage/ring and does not end until the inspector(s) re-enter the cage/ring, upon conclusion of the fight.

- Instant replay may be used to review a "Fight Ending Sequence" and shall only be used after a fight has been officially stopped. Once instant replay has been used to review a fight ending sequence, the fight shall not be resumed.
- 4. All fighters are required to wear a mouthpiece during competition. The round cannot begin without the mouthpiece. If the mouthpiece is dislodged during competition, the referee will call time and have the mouthpiece replaced at the first opportune moment, without interfering with the immediate action. Points may be deducted by the referee if he/she feels the mouthpiece is being purposefully spit out.
- 5. If an MMA bout is being conducted in a ring and is a fighter is knocked out of the ring, the fighter must return to the ring unassisted by spectators or his/her seconds. If assisted by anyone, the fighter may lose points or be disqualified with such a decision being within the sole discretion of the referee. Once knocked from the ring, the competitor will have five (5) minutes to return to fighting surface, similar to an accidental foul, but shall be examined by the ringside physician before returning to action.
- 6. The reapplication of petroleum jelly or another similar substance, to the face, may be allowed between rounds and shall only be applied by an approved cutman or licensed cornerman.
- 7.. Hand Wraps.

a. A maximum of one roll (no more than 2" wide by 15 yards in length) of white, soft, cloth gauze is permitted per hand. The gauze may not exceed the wrist of the competitor's glove. The exposed thumb is an option to be protected.

b. A maximum of one roll (no more than 1.25" wide by 10' in length) of white athletic tape is permitted per hand. The tape may not exceed the wrist of the competitor's gloves. Tape may be placed through the fingers but may not cover the knuckles. The exposed thumb is an option to be protected.

c. A single layer of elastic or flex-type tape is allowed to be applied over the completed wrap. *d.* Approved tape/gauze of all brands may be allowed.

8. Joint/Body Coverings.

a. Other than the competitor's hands (as previously listed), there will be no taping, covering or protective gear of any kind on the upper body. This includes but is not limited to: joint sleeves, padding, any form of brace or body gauze/tape.

b. A competitor may use soft neoprene type sleeves to cover only the knee or ankle joints. Approved sleeves may not have: padding, Velcro, plastic, metal, ties or any other material considered to be unsafe or that may create an unfair advantage. Tape and gauze or any materials other than the approved sleeves are not permitted on the lower body. The sleeves must be Black in color, with the exception of matching the athletes

Commission assigned corner with sleeves being Red or Blue in color as appropriate.

9. Cage/Ring Attire.

a. All mixed martial artists will be required to wear such protective gear as deemed necessary by the Commission.

b. Male contestants shall not wear any form of clothing on their upper body.

c. Male and female mixed martial artists shall wear the appropriate trunks, mouthpiece, and gloves. Male mixed martial artists shall also wear the appropriate groin protection.

d. Female mixed martial artists shall wear a short sleeved (above the elbow) or sleeveless form fitting rash guard and/or sports bra(s). No loose-fitting tops and/or breast protectors shall be allowed. Female competitors will follow the same requirements for bottom covering as the male competitors, minus the requirement for groin protection.

e. The hem of the trunks may not extend below the knee.

f. Fighting shorts/trunks shall not have exposed Velcro, pockets, or zippers.

g. Mixed martial artists in the same match, contest, or exhibition may wear different color

trunks or be designated by glove taping and/or glove coloring to the corner they are assigned. *h*. Mixed martial artists shall not wear shoes in the cage or ring.

i. When deemed necessary by the referee all mixed martial artists shall have their hair secured in a manner that does not interfere with the vision and safety of either contestant.

i. No object can be worn to secure the contestant's hair which may cause injury to either contestant.

j. The wearing of jewelry will be strictly prohibited during all contests.

k. Wearing body cosmetics shall be prohibited during all contests. Wearing facial cosmetics shall be at the discretion of the commission and/or referee.

<u>Fouls</u>

1. Butting with the head;

a. The head may not be used as a striking instrument in any fashion. Any use of the head as a striking instrument whether head to head, head to body or otherwise is illegal.

2. Eye gouging of any kind;

a. Eye gouging by means of fingers, chin, or elbow is illegal. Legal strikes or punches that contact the fighter's eye socket are not eye gouging and shall be considered legal attacks.

3. Biting or spitting at an opponent;

a. Biting in any form is illegal. A fighter must recognize that a referee may not be able to physically observe some actions and must make the referee aware if they are being bit during an exhibition of unarmed combat.

4. Fish Hooking;

a. Any attempt by a fighter to use their fingers in a manner that attacks their opponent's mouth, nose or ears, stretching the skin to that area will be considered "Fish hooking". Fish hooking generally is the placing of fingers into the mouth or your opponent and pulling your hands in opposing directions while holding onto the skin of your opponent.

5. Hair pulling;

a. Pulling of the hair in any fashion is an illegal action. A fighter may not grab a hold of his opponent's hair to control their opponent in any way. If a fighter has long hair, they may not use their hair as a tool for holding or choking in any fashion.

6. Spiking the opponent to the canvas onto the head or neck (pile-driving);

a. Any throw with an arc to its motion is to be considered a legal throw. It does not matter if the opponents head hits the canvas. A pile driver is considered to be any throw where you control your opponent's body placing their feet up in the air with their head straight down and then forcibly drives the opponents head into the canvas or flooring material. It should be noted when a fighter is placed into a submission hold by their opponent, if that fighter is capable of elevating their opponent, they may bring that opponent down in any fashion they desire because they are not in control of their opponent's body. The fighter who is attempting the submission can either adjust their position or let go of their hold before being slammed to the canvas.

7. Strikes to the spine or the back of the head;

a. The back of the head starts at the Crown of the head with a one (1) inch variance to either side, running down the back of the head to the occipital junction.

b. This area stretches out at the occipital junction (nape of the neck) to cover the entire width of the neck. It then travels down the spine with a one (1) inch variance from the spine's centerline, including the tailbone.

- 8. Throat strikes of any kind and/or grabbing the trachea; a. No directed throat strikes are allowed. A directed attack would include a fighter pulling his opponents head in a way to open the neck area for a striking attack. A fighter may not gouge their fingers or thumb into their opponent's neck or trachea in an attempt to submit their opponent. If during stand-up action of a fight a strike is thrown and the strike lands in the throat area of the fighter, this shall be viewed as a clean and legal blow.
- 9. Fingers outstretched toward an opponent's face/eyes; a. In the standing position, a fighter that moves their arm(s) toward their opponent with an open hand, fingers pointing at the opponent's face/eyes, will be a foul. Referees are to prevent this dangerous behavior by communicating clearly to fighters. Fighters are directed to close their fists or point their fingers straight up in the air when reaching toward their opponent.
- Downward pointing elbow strike (12 to 6);

 a. The use of a linear "straight up straight down" elbow strike is prohibited. Any variation of this straight up and down linear elbow strike makes the strike legal. Any arc, or any angle change from straight up to straight down makes the strike legal. Any variation of position does not alter the legality of the strike.
- 11. Groin attacks of any kind;

a. Any attack to the groin area including, striking, grabbing, pinching or twisting is illegal. It should be clear that groin attacks are the same for men and women.

12. Kneeing and/or Kicking the head of a grounded opponent;

a. A grounded fighter is defined as: Any part of the body, other sole of the feet touching the fighting area floor. To be grounded, the palm of one hand (a flat palm) must be down, and/or any other body part must be touching the fighting area floor. A single knee, arm, (not fingers) makes the fighter grounded without having to have any other body part in touch with the fighting area floor. At this time, kicks or knees to the head will not be allowed.

13. Stomping of a grounded fighter;

a. Stomping is considered any type of striking action with the feet where the fighter lifts their leg up bending their leg at the knee and initiating a striking action with the bottom of their foot or heel.

b. Axe kicks are not stomping. Standing foot stops are NOT a foul. As such, this foul does not include stomping the feet of a standing fighter.

14. Holding opponent's gloves or shorts;

a. A fighter may not control their opponent's movement by holding onto their opponent's shorts or gloves. A fighter may hold onto or grab their opponent's hand as long as they are not controlling the hand only by using the material of the glove, but by actually gripping the hand of the opponent. It is legal to hold onto your own gloves or shorts.

15. Holding or grabbing the fence or ropes with fingers or toes;

a. A fighter may put their hands on the fence and push off of it at any time. A fighter may place their feet onto the cage and have their toes go through the fencing material at any time. When a fighter's fingers or toes go through the cage and grab hold of the fence and start to control either their body position or their opponent's body position it now becomes an illegal action. A fighter may not grab the ropes or wrap their arms over or under the ring ropes at any time. The fighter may not purposely step through the ropes. If a fighter is caught holding the fence, cage or ring rope material the referee may issue a one-point deduction from the offending fighters scorecard if the foul caused a substantial effect in the fight. If a point deduction for holding the fence occurs, and because of the infraction, the fouling fighter ends up in a superior position due to the foul, the fighters should be re-started by the referee, standing in a neutral position.

- Small joint manipulation;
 a. Fingers and Toes are small joints. Wrists, Ankles, Knees, Shoulders and Elbows are all large joints. Grabbing the majority of fingers/toes at once is allowed.
- 17. Throwing an opponent out of the ring or caged area;

a. A fighter shall not throw their opponent out of the ring or cage.

- Intentionally placing a finger into any orifice, or into any cut or laceration of your Opponent;
 a. A fighter may not place their fingers into an open laceration in an attempt to enlarge the cut. A fighter may not place their fingers into an opponent's, nose, ears, mouth, or any body cavity.
- 19. Clawing, pinching, twisting the flesh;

a. Any attack that targets the fighter's skin by clawing at the skin or attempting to pull or twist the skin to apply pain is illegal.

- 20. Timidity (avoiding contact, or consistently dropping the mouthpiece, or faking an injury; a. Timidity is defined as any fighter who purposely avoids contact with his opponent or runs away from the action of the fight. Timidity can also be called by the referee for any attempt by a fighter to receive time by falsely claiming a foul, injury, or purposely dropping or spitting out their mouthpiece or other action designed to stall or delay the action of the fight
- 21. Use of abusive language in the fighting area;

a. The use of abusive language is not allowed during MMA competition. It is the sole responsibility of the referee to determine when language crosses over the line to abusive. It should be clear that fighters can talk during a match. The mere use of auditory language is not a violation of this rule. Examples of abusive language would be (Racially motivated or Derogatory language).

22. Flagrant disregard of the referee's instructions;

a. A fighter MUST follow the instructions of the referee at all times. Any deviation or non-compliance may result in the fighter's disqualification.

23. Unsportsmanlike conduct that causes an injury to opponent;

a. Every athlete competing in the sport of MMA is expected to represent the sport in a positive light emphasizing sportsmanship and humility. Any athlete that disrespects the rules of the sport or attempts to inflict unnecessary harm on a competitor who has been either taken out of the competition by the referee or has tapped out of the competition shall be viewed as being unsportsmanlike.

- 24. Attacking an opponent after the bell has sounded the end of the period of unarmed combat; a. The end of a round is signified by the sound of the bell and the call of time by the referee. Once the referee has made the call of time, any offensive actions initiated by the fighter shall be considered after the bell and illegal.
- 25. Attacking an opponent on or during the break;
 - a. A fighter shall not engage their opponent in any fashion during a time-out or break of action in competition.
- 26. Attacking an opponent who is under the care of the referee;

a. Once the referee has called for a stop of the action to protect a fighter who has been incapacitated or is unable to continue to compete in the fight, fighters shall cease all offensive actions against their opponent.

27. Interference from a mixed martial artist's corner or seconds;

a. Interference is defined as any action or activity aimed at disrupting the fight or causing an unfair advantage to be given to a corner's combatant. Corners are not allowed to distract the referee or influence the actions of the referee in any fashion.

A. Intentional Fouls

1. If an intentional foul causes an injury, and the injury is severe enough to terminate the bout immediately, the fighter causing the injury shall lose by disqualification.

2. If an intentional foul causes an injury and the bout is allowed to continue, the referee shall notify the authorities and deduct two (2) points from the fighter who caused the foul. Point deductions for intentional fouls will be mandatory.

3. If an intentional foul causes a laceration and/or swelling and the bout is allowed to continue, and the injury results in the fight being stopped in any round after ½ of the scheduled rounds, of the fight has been completed, by either another legal or illegal strike, the injured fighter will win by TECHNICAL DECISION if they are ahead on the score cards; and the bout will result in a TECHNICAL DRAW if the injured fighter is behind or even on the score cards.

4. If the fighter injures himself/herself while attempting to intentionally foul their opponent, the referee will not act in their favor, and this injury shall be the same as one produced by a fair blow.

5. If the referee feels that a fighter has conducted themselves in an unsportsmanlike manner, they may stop the action of the fight to deduct points or stop the bout to disqualify the fighter.

B. Accidental Fouls

1.If an accidental foul causes an injury severe enough for the referee to stop the bout, the bout will result in either a NO CONTEST or DISQUALIFICATION if stopped before:

- A completed 2 rounds of a scheduled 3 round bout or
- A completed 3 rounds of a scheduled 5 round bout

2. If an accidental foul causes an injury severe enough for the referee to stop the bout after

- A completed 2 rounds of a scheduled 3 round bout or
- A completed 3 rounds of a scheduled 5 round bout

The bout will result in a TECHNICAL DECISION awarded to the fighter who is ahead on the score cards at the time the bout is stopped. Partial or incomplete rounds will be scored. If no action has occurred, the round should be scored as an even round. This is at the discretion of the judges.

3. If a fighter, during the course of a round, visibly loses control of bodily function (vomit, urine, feces), the fight shall be stopped by the referee and the fighter shall lose the contest by a Technical Knockout (TKO) due to Medical Stoppage.

i. In the event a loss of bodily function occurs in the rest period between rounds, the ringside physician shall be called in to evaluate if the combatant can continue. If the combatant is not cleared by the ringside physician to continue, that combatant shall lose by a Technical Knockout (TKO) due to Medical Stoppage.

ii. If fecal matter becomes apparent at any time, the contest shall be halted by the referee, and the offending combatant shall lose by a Technical Knockout (TKO) due to Medical Stoppage

C. Foul Procedures: If a foul is committed, the referee shall:

- 1. Call Time;
- 2. Check the fouled mixed martial artist's condition and safety; and
- 3. Assess the foul for potential point(s) deductions and/or time considerations.
- 4. During all time out procedures, there shall be no coaching of a contestant permitted.

D. Time Consideration:

Low Blow

A fighter who has been stuck with a low blow is allowed up to five minutes to recover from the foul as long as in the ringside doctor's opinion the fighter my possibly continue on in the contest. If the fighter states that they can continue on before the five minutes of time have expired, the Referee shall as soon as practical restart the fight. If the fighter goes over the five minutes time allotment the fight cannot be restarted and the contest must come to an end with the outcome determined by the round and time in which the fight was stopped.

Eye Poke

A fighter who has received an eye poke as called by the referee is allowed up to five minutes to recover from the foul as long as the ringside doctors confirms the fighter may possibly continue in the contest once recovered. If the fighter states they can see and wish to continue, and confirmed by doctor, the referee shall as soon as practical restart the fight. If the fighter goes over the five-minute time allotment the fight cannot be restarted and the contest must come to an end with the outcome determined by the round and time in which the fight was stopped.

A. Judging Criteria

a. All bouts will be evaluated and scored by a minimum of three (3) judges.

- **b.** The 10 Point Must System will be the standard of scoring about.
 - **i.** Under the 10-Point Must Scoring System, 10 points must be awarded to the winner of the round and nine points or less must be awarded to the loser, except for a rare even round, which is scored (10-10).

c. Judges shall evaluate Mixed Martial Arts techniques, such as effective striking/grappling(Plan A), effective aggressiveness(Plan B),and control of the fighting area(Plan C).Plans B and C are not taken into consideration unless Plan A is weighed as being even.

d. Evaluations shall be made in the specific order in which the techniques appear in (c)above ,giving the most weight in scoring to effective striking/grappling, and effective aggressiveness, and control of the fighting area.

e. Effective striking is judged by determining the impact/effect of legal strikes landed by a contestant solely based on the results of such legal strikes. Effective grappling is assessed by the successful executions and impactful/effective result(s)coming from: takedown(s), submission attempt(s), achieving an advantageous position(s) and reversal(s).

f. Effective aggressiveness means aggressively making attempts to finish the fight. **g.** Fighting area control is assessed by determining who is dictating the pace, place and position of the bout.

My name is Kallum Parker, this is my written response in regards to Mr. Hamptons "Petition For Change Of Decision"

October 22, 2022, I competed in an MMA bout vs Mathew Hampton.

The bout lasted three rounds. It was a very high paced fight.

At the beginning of the first round, I took my opponent down. I was able to control him and keep him on the ground while landing effective strikes. I kept him down for most of round one. I think we both got up within under a min left in the round and we both finished that round striking. I felt I won round one 10-9.

Second round was also very high paced. Most of this fight was fought against the fence. We were both exchanging and I had the higher output in effective striking. I landed a few strikes that staggered my opponent and also landed a body shot that dropped my opponent to his knees. I thought the ref might stop it when my opponent fell to his knees. I believe I won round two 10-8

Third round, the fight went back to fighting against the cage. My plan was to take him down or lean on him against the fence and continue to score or look for takedown. I remember my opponent, at one point, attempted to pick me up. In a quick reaction to balance myself, I grabbed the fence. As a result, I received a verbal warning from the ref. Even though that round was closer I believe I did enough to win that round 10-9

To the best of my knowledge, the only time I grabbed the fence, resulted in a warning from the referee. As a professional athlete, it is my job to go in the cage, fight, and follow the instructions of the referee and Athletic Commission. I respect the art of MMA, I would not ever intentionally use the fence as an advantage to win a fight. I rely on the referee to recognize the rules of the fight, not the commentary.

This is my third professional fight. I am grateful to be fighting under the California Athletic Commission.



1. GENERAL RULES

The BYB Trigon Combat rules will apply to all BYB Trigon Combat Bouts ("Bouts") under the approval and supervision of the applicable State Commission.

Only water or sports drinks may be consumed before the Bout.

Upon arrival at the venue Fighters will be under the direct supervision of the Inspector from the applicable State Commission.

2. INSPECTORS

Each Fighter will be assigned an Inspector.

Upon arrival at the venue the Fighter will report to their dressing room. From then on they will be under the direct supervision of the Inspector until he releases the Fighter.

Inspectors are in charge of the dressing room and the corners.

No one other than those individuals working the corner will be allowed in the dressing rooms, all individuals must have a current license issued by the applicable State Commission.

3. DRUG TESTING

Fighters will be notified before the Bout if they will undergo drug testing.

If the Fighters are selected to be tested, they may only consume water or sports drink after the Bout.

The Fighters must provide a specimen in the manner instructed by the Inspector.

The Fighters will not be paid until a specimen has been provided.

4. DURATION OF ROUNDS

BYB Trigon Combat Male Bouts are scheduled for five (5) rounds, three (3) minutes in duration.

BYB Trigon Combat Female Bouts are scheduled for five (5) rounds, two (2) minutes in duration.

Championship fights are extended by two (2) rounds:

BYB Trigon Combat Championship Bouts are Seven (7) rounds, three (3) minutes (males) or two (2) minutes (females) in duration

The ringside physician or referee can stop the fight at any time.

5. WEIGHT CLASSIFICATIONS

6. FIGHTER EQUIPMENT AND ATTIRE

BYB Trigon Combat is the final authority in all equipment matters under the supervision of the applicable State Commission.

Improper use and or tampering with any equipment prior to the Bout may result in a removal from competition and if during a Bout, a point(s) deduction or DISQUALIFICATION.

Proper athletic shoes/boots must be worn while inside the Trigon.

No body shirts are allowed.

Pants are not allowed.

The wearing of contact lenses during competition is prohibited.

The wearing of piercing accessories during competition is prohibited.

Fingernails and toenails must be cut and trimmed prior to any Bout.

Hair is to be secured with soft materials only.

Fighter cannot use any additional tape, gauze or protective gear. No additional padding, braces or joint sleeves. Fighter can use state Commission approved soft neoprene sleeves as long as there is no zippers, ties, padding, Velcro or any other material that could be viewed as dangerous.

Other than a light coat of Vaseline around the eyebrows and face NONE may be used on any other part of the body.

Each Fighter shall have a form fitted mouthpiece. The mouthpiece is to be worn at all times during competition. A second backup mouthpiece is strongly recommended.

The Bout cannot start without the mouthpiece.

Each Fighter shall wear a foul-proof groin protector at all times during competition.

7. WEIGHT LOSS

Weight loss as determined by BYB Trigon Combat or the applicable State Commission to be detrimental to the health and safety of the Fighter will not be allowed. This supersedes any language on any presently used Bout agreement.

8. HAND WRAPS/GLOVES

All Fighters in BYB Trigon Combat shall wear minimum of four (4) ounce gloves and maximum of eight (8) ounces as governed by the applicable State Commission. Gloves shall be provided by BYB. The glove sizes will not alter the weight of the gloves, and shall be available in all traditional sizes.

Fighters shall choose their glove size the day prior to their Bout, as monitored and administered by BYB and State Athletic Commission.

A maximum of one (1) roll of white, cloth gauze is permitted per hand with a size of no more than 2" wide x 15 yards in length). The gauze may not exceed the wrist of the Fighter's glove.

A maximum of one (1) roll of white athletic tape is permitted per hand with a size of no more than 1.25" wide x 10' in length. The tape may not exceed the wrist of the Fighter's gloves. Tape may be placed through the fingers, but may not cover the knuckles.

A single layer of flex-type tape may be applied over the completed wrap.

Gauze and tape of all brands may be allowed if approved by the applicable State Commission.

9. SOLE ARBITER

The Referee is the sole arbiter and is the only individual authorized to:

- interpret rules and situations
- determine if a blow was legal or a foul and if a foul, if it was intentional or accidental
- declare that an accidental Injury has occurred

The Referee may stop the Bout.

10. DOCTOR STOPPAGE

- The ringside physician my halt the contest at any time to check on a Fighter.
- The ringside physician may stop the contest for any medical reason at any time during the contest.

11. METHODS OF WINNING

KNOCKOUT: Fighter is unable to intelligently defend himself following a strike(s).

TKO: If the licensed ringside physician or referee decides the Fighter cannot continue due to a cut or other injury.

REFEREE STOPPAGE: The referee may stop the Bout when one Fighter can no longer defend themselves, can not or will not quit, or for any other reason to preserve the health and safety of the Fighter.

DOCTOR STOPPAGE: The Doctor may stop the Bout at any time, when one Fighter can no longer defend themselves, cannot or will not tap out, has a cut, injury or for any other reason to preserve the health and safety of the Fighter.

DECISION: When the Bout has ended after its specified time period without a winner, it shall be scored by the three judges.

DISQUALIFICATION: Fouling and or unsportsmanlike conduct as determined by the Referee.

12. SCORING OF THE BOUT

All Bouts will be evaluated and scored by three (3) judges using the Ten (10) Point Must System. Judges results will be either of: Unanimous Decision, Split Decision, Majority Decision or Draw.

In exigent circumstances and at the discretion of the Applicable State Commission a referee may be allowed to judge a Bout.

In the event that a Bout ends by TECHNICAL DECISION, the Judges will score the partial round.

Basic scoring guidelines:

- Striking
- Overall Control

Dominating Scoring Technique:

Strike Knockdown

13. LEGAL TECHNIQUES

HAND STRIKES: With a closed fist to the legal scoring area. All other strikes will be deemed illegal

14. SECONDS

Seconds must stay in their Fighter's area outside the Trigon while the Bout is in progress.

Seconds may not lean on the Trigon during the Bout.

There can be no more than two (2) seconds working in each corner.

In cases where a cut or injury needs to be treated, the cut man is also allowed into the cage.

All seconds will be under the direct supervision of the corner Inspector.

Any second who conducts himself or herself in an unruly manner will be removed from the corner.

A violation of the rules or unsportsmanlike tactics as determined by the Referee may also result in administrative discipline to include a fine, suspension and or a withholding of pay.

A Fighter may lose point(s) due to the misconduct of his or her second(s).

15. CHIEF SECOND

One of the seconds will be deemed the Chief Second. This Chief Second is responsible for all activities in the corner during the Bout.

If the corner wants the Bout stopped, he or she is to notify the Inspector.

16. CUT MAN

All medicine for cuts shall be under the rules of the applicable State Commission, and will always be made available to an Inspector upon request for physician's approval.

All medicines for cuts must be in their original packaging.

The only generally approved medicines for cuts are:

- Adrenalin 1:1000 It is a clear liquid that is usually stored in a dark bottle because it is adversely affected by prolonged light. It is a potent vaso-constrictor (constricts torn blood vessels and helps to decrease flow of blood). It is almost tasteless. Very little is absorbed through the cut. It is usually applied by Q-tip to a cut or a bleeding nose (inside).
- Avitene It is a Microfibullar Collagen Hemostat (agent that stops bleeding). It is usually in white powder form or white thin sheets of material like cloth. It is usually applied to a bleeding surface. It causes platelets to adhere.
- **Thrombin** It works on fibrinogen (a protein in the blood plasma that is essential for the coagulation of blood). Blood must be removed prior to usage. It must be fresh if left in a bag for months it becomes useless. Needs refrigeration. The liquid is applied directly to cut.

17. MOUTHPIECE

All Fighters are required to wear a mouthpiece during the Bout. It is strongly recommended that all Fighters have two (2) form fitted mouthpieces available for use in each Bout.

The round cannot begin without the mouthpiece inside the Fighter's mouth and set in place. The mouthpiece must be inside the Fighter's mouth and properly set at all times during the Bout.

If the mouthpiece is dislodged during the Bout, the Referee will wait until the first opportune moment, without interfering with the action, call time out and have the mouthpiece replaced.

At the discretion of the Referee, point(s) may be deducted or a DISQUALIFICATION rendered in the following situations:

- If the mouthpiece is not being properly kept inside of the Fighter's mouth
- If the mouthpiece is purposely spit out
- If the corner fails to have the Fighter resume competition with the mouthpiece in place, and or delays in replacing it after it has become dislodged

18. FIGHTER DOWN AFTER THE BELL

The round ends when the bell rings to end the round.

In the event that legal blows during the round negatively affect an Fighter, and he or she goes down after the bell has sounded to end the fight, the Referee will consider that the round is over.

The Referee may then allow the Fighter's corner to assist him or her, and or summon the Ringside Physician to evaluate the Fighter.

19. BLOWS AT OR AFTER THE BELL

A blow that strikes a Fighter concurrent with the sounding of the bell is deemed to be a legal blow.

A blow that strikes a Fighter after the sounding of the bell is deemed to be a foul that the Referee will determine if it was Accidental or Intentional.

20. TERMINATION OF A BOUT DUE TO A FAIR BLOW

If an Fighter sustains an injury from a fair blow(s) and the injury is severe enough to immediately terminate the Bout, the injured Fighter will lose by TECHNICAL KNOCKOUT (TKO).

21. END OF THE FIGHT ANNOUNCEMENT

The Timekeeper will signal the eminent end of the fight when there are ten (10) seconds left in the fight.

22. OFFICIAL END OF THE FIGHT

The fight ends at the end of the scheduled rounds or by doctor or referee stoppage either by KO, TKO, DQ or decision.

23. FOULS AND ILLEGAL TECHNIQUES

The following tactics are fouls and are forbidden. Use of these tactics shall result in a warning and loss of points or immediate disqualification as determined by the referee.

(1) Headbutts

(2) Striking using the elbow, knee, shoulder, kick or any strike not using a closed fist to the approved target area

(3) Open hand attacks to the eyes or throat or eye gouging

(4) Striking at that part of the body over the kidney or spine or chopping or striking the back of the neck or head

(5) Spitting

(6) Hitting an opponent while on the ground

(7) Any unsportsmanlike trick or action that causes any injury to an opponent or referee

(8) Attacking on the break

(9) Attacking after the bell has sounded ending the round, or when the opponent is out of the ring

(10) Intentionally pushing, shoving or wrestling an opponent out of the cage with any part of the body

(11) Continuous dropping of mouthpiece

(12) Intentional evasion of contact

- (13) Hair pulling
- (14) Attacking or obstructing the trachea
- (15) Clawing, pinching or twisting the flesh or grabbing the clavicle
- (16) Pulling or holding uniform below hipline
- (17) Striking while holding ropes
- (18) Small joint manipulation (e.g. twisting of fingers or toes)
- (19) Groin attacks

(20) Fish hooks (21) Biting

The following tactics are fouls and are forbidden. Use of these tactics shall result in a warning and loss of points or immediate disqualification as determined by the referee.

- (1) Striking a Fighter when he or she is down
- (2) Putting a finger into any orifice or into any cut or laceration of an opponent
- (3) Striking an opponent when the opponent is down

In addition to or in lieu of losing points, any Fighter guilty of any of the foul tactics listed in subsections above may be disqualified, his or her purse may be with held from payment, and may be suspended. Disposition of the purse and the penalty to be imposed upon the Fighter shall be determined by action of the applicable State Commission.

Fighters may NOT grab the ropes of the Trigon AT ANY TIME that the two (2) Fighters are in contact with each other during the Bout in an attempt to stall action, trap the opponent, escape a technique, or otherwise gain advantage in the Bout.

Fighters may momentarily grab the ropes of the Trigon to brace or steady themselves or to gain/maintain their balance.

If a Fighter continually holds the ropes of the Trigon to rest, or pull themselves from the action, avoid the Bout's action, or otherwise gain advantage in the match, the referee will deduct a point(s) from the offending Fighter.

Excessive grabbing or other use of the Trigon ropes or violation of these guidelines may result, in the referee's sole discretion, in an Fighter's disqualification and an award of the Bout to the opponent.

24. REFEREE ACTION ON FOULS

The Referee shall inform the State Commission as soon as possible of the following:

- The type of foul
- If the foul was accidental or intentional
- If point(s) will be deducted from the offending Fighter
- If the offending Fighter will be disqualified
- If the Five (5) minute rule will or will not be applied
- If the Bout will or will not continue

The Referee must declare if a blow was legal or a foul and if a foul, if it was Accidental or Intentional.

Deduction of point(s) for fouls will be done at the time of the infraction.

If an Intentional Foul causes an injury, and the injury is severe enough to immediately terminate the Bout, the Fighter causing the injury shall lose by DISQUALIFICATION.

Deduction of point(s) for Intentional Fouls is mandatory.

If an Intentional Foul causes an injury and the fouled Fighter can continue, the Referee will deduct points from the offending Fighter at his discretion from the Fighter who committed the foul.

25. CONCUSSIVE HEAD IMPACT FOULS

The Referee must consult with the Ringside Physician in all cases involving concussive head impact fouls. The Referee in conjunction with the Ringside Physician will determine the length of time needed to evaluate the affected Fighter and his or her suitability to continue.

A. INTENTIONAL

If the Referee determines that a foul to the head was intentional, he will follow the Intentional Foul rule and guidelines considering that allowing the Bout to continue may subject the Fighter to a severe injury. If the affected Fighter is not badly injured and their chance of winning has not been seriously jeopardized because of the foul, the Bout may be allowed to continue. If the Bout is allowed to continue, the offending Fighter will be issued an official warning and have two (2) points deducted from his or her score.

If the Referee determines that the affected Fighter cannot continue, the offending Fighter will lose by DISQUALIFICATION.

B. ACCIDENTAL

If the Referee determines that a foul to the head was accidental, he will follow the Accidental Foul rule and guidelines considering that allowing the Bout to continue may subject an Fighter to a severe injury. If the affected Fighter is not badly injured and their chance of winning has not been seriously jeopardized because of the foul, the Bout may be allowed to continue.

26. THE FIVE (5) MINUTE RULE

The five (5) minute rule is only applicable to low blow fouls.

In cases where another foul or an accidental injury occurs and there is a need to temporarily stop the Bout, the length of time needed to evaluate the affected Fighter will be determined by the Referee in clear consultation with the Ringside Physician.

27. LOW BLOW

A. Intentional

If the Referee determines that the low blow foul was intentional, he will follow the Intentional Foul guidelines. If the offended Fighter is not badly injured and their chance of winning has not been seriously jeopardized because of the foul, the Five (5) Minute rule may be applied.

If the Referee determines that the Fighter cannot continue, the offending Fighter will lose by DISQUALIFICATION.

B. Accidental

In cases where a Fighter is hit with an accidental low blow and claims injury, the Referee, at his discretion, may apply the Five (5) Minute Rule. If the injured Fighter cannot resume boxing before the recovery period ends, the injured Fighter will lose the Bout by TECHNICAL KNOCKOUT.

28. DISQUALIFICATION

An Fighter will lose by DISQUALIFICATION when he or she has:

- fouled and caused harm to their opponent
- continually refused to follow the rules
- continually disobeyed the Referee

29. SELF-INJURY

If a Fighter injures himself or herself while attempting to intentionally foul their opponent or by performing an unorthodox move, the Referee will not take any action in their favor, and the injury will be considered the same as one produced by a fair blow.

In cases of Self-Injury the Fighter must resume competition when ordered. If the injured Fighter cannot resume boxing when ordered to do so by the Referee, he or she will lose the Bout by TECHNICAL KNOCKOUT.

30. SUSPENSION OF THE BOUT FOR UNFORESEEN REASONS

If a Bout has to be suspended for any reason other than the actions of the Fighters, the Referee will have the clock stopped and attend to the issue.

The Referee and applicable State Commission will decide the length of time allotted to address the issue.

ALL reasonable efforts shall be made to resume the Bout as soon as possible. It is expected that the responsible party or parties make a true effort to resolve the issue.

If the Bout is unexpectedly stopped under suspicious circumstances all or part of the following actions may take place:

- if a Fighter and or their corner is involved, the offending Fighter may be DISQUALIFIED
- the Fighters' purses may be withheld until a formal hearing takes place
- any participant may be monetarily fined and or administratively disciplined

• the matter may be referred to the appropriate law enforcement agency

31. USE OF VASELINE/LINIMENTS

The discretionary use of Vaseline around the eyes and lightly around the face is permissible. However, its use on any other body parts is strictly prohibited.


The use of liniments and or greased muscle pain relievers is also prohibited.

32. CONSUMABLES DURING THE BOUT


Fighters may only consume pure water during the Bout. Sports drinks, similar liquids, drugs, or other substances are prohibited. The use of banned substances is grounds for DISQUALIFICATION and administrative disciplinary action.



BACKGROUND

Currently MMA Fighters do not have a guaranteed source of income or retirement benefits once their career has ended. This pension fund would ensure MMA fighters have a modicum source of income after they've reached the peak of their fighting career or suffered from an unexpected injury that shortened their career.

AB1136 will ensure that licensed professional mixed martial arts (MMA) fighters have access to a pension fund. The pension fund would be financed through ticket sales, the sale of sports paraphernalia, and souvenirs.

This would expand on current existing law that has enabled licensed professional boxers to have access to a pension fund.

RECOMMENDATION

I recommend the Commission support and sponsor Assemblymember Haney's bill, AB1136 to establish a Mixed Martial Arts Pension Fund. I recommend that the Commission direct the staff to start drafting emergency Mixed Martial Arts Pension Fund Regulations to bring before the Commission if AB 1136 passes.

ASSEMBLY BILL

No. 1136

Introduced by Assembly Member Haney

February 15, 2023

An act to add Article 17 (commencing with Section 18888) to Chapter 2 of Division 8 of the Business and Professions Code, relating to business, and making an appropriation therefor.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

AB 1136, as introduced, Haney. State Athletic Commission: mixed martial arts: pension fund.

Existing law, the Boxing Act, also known as the State Athletic Commission Act, creates within the Department of Consumer Affairs the State Athletic Commission. Under existing law, the commission has sole direction, management, control of, and jurisdiction over all professional and amateur boxing and kickboxing, all forms and combinations of full contact martial arts contests, including mixed martial arts, and matches or exhibits conducted, held, or given within California. Existing law authorizes the commission to license professional and amateur boxers, professional and amateur martial arts fighters, and booking agents, managers of professional boxers and professional martial arts fighters, trainers, chief seconds, and seconds of each. Existing law prohibits a person from participating in any contest, or serving in the capacity of a booking agent, manager, trainer, or second, unless they have been licensed for that purpose by the commission.

Existing law establishes the Boxers' Pension Fund, a retirement fund under the exclusive control of the commission, that is funded by an assessment on tickets that is transferred to the commission following a

contest or wrestling exhibition, as prescribed, and by contributions by boxers, managers, promoters, or any one or more of these persons. Existing law requires all moneys in the Boxers' Pension Fund to be continuously appropriated to be used exclusively for the purposes and administration of the pension fund. Existing law prohibits any moneys with the Boxers' Pension Fund from being deposited or transferred to the general fund.

This bill would require the commission to establish, similar to the Boxers' Pension Fund, the Mixed Martial Arts (MMA) Pension Fund and would continuously appropriate the moneys in the MMA Pension Fund for purposes of administration of a pension plan for martial artists. The bill would give the commission exclusive control of all funds in the MMA Pension Fund, prohibit any funds from being deposited or transferred to the General Fund, and require the funds to be invested as prescribed. The bill would authorize the commission to establish a method for financing the pension plan for martial artists, including by assessment on tickets to events under the commission's jurisdiction, by revenue generated through the sale of sport paraphernalia and souvenirs, and by contributions from mixed martial artists, managers, promoters, or any one or more of these persons. The bill would authorize the commission to award an early pension benefit for vocational, education, training, or medical need in the amount contained in the covered martial artist's pension plan account, as specified. The bill would make related findings and declarations.

This bill would include a change in state statute that would result in a taxpayer paying a higher tax within the meaning of Section 3 of Article XIII A of the California Constitution, and thus would require for passage the approval of $\frac{2}{3}$ of the membership of each house of the Legislature.

Vote: $\frac{2}{3}$. Appropriation: yes. Fiscal committee: yes. State-mandated local program: no.

The people of the State of California do enact as follows:

3 (b) That professional athletes licensed under this chapter, as a 4 group, for many reasons, do not retain their earnings, and are often 5 injured or destitute, or both, and unable to take proper care of 6 themselves, whether financially or otherwise, and that the 7 enactment of this article is to serve a public purpose by making 8 provisions for a needy group to insure a modicum of financial 9 security for professional athletes.

(c) Athletes licensed under this chapter may suffer extraordinary 10 disabilities in the normal course of their trade. These may include 11 12 acute and chronic traumatic brain injuries, resulting from multiple 13 concussions as well as from repeated exposure to a large number 14 of subconcussive punches and kicks, eye injuries, including retinal 15 tears, holes, and detachments, and other neurological impairments. 16 (d) The pension plan of the commission is part of the state's 17 health and safety regulatory scheme, designed to protect 18 professional athletes, including mixed martial artists, licensed

under this chapter from the health-related hazards of their trade.
The pension plan addresses those health and safety needs,
recognizing the disability and health maintenance expenses those
needs may require.

(e) The regulatory system of California is interrelated with the
conduct of the trade in every jurisdiction. Athletes licensed under
this chapter participate in contests in other states and many athletes
who are based in those other jurisdictions may participate in
California on a single-event basis.

(f) The outcomes and natures of fights in other jurisdictions are
relevant to California regulatory jurisdiction and are routinely
monitored for health and safety reasons, so that, for example, a
knockout of an athlete licensed under this chapter in another
jurisdiction is paid appropriate heed with respect to establishing
a waiting period before that athlete may commence fighting in
California.

35 (g) The monitoring of other jurisdictions is an integral part of 36 the health and safety of California athletes licensed under this 37 chapter due to the interstate nature of the trade, and therefore the 38 regulatory scheme for contests and athletes under this chapter 39 should reflect this accordingly.

1 18888.1. For purposes of this article, "martial artist" shall mean

a licensed professional mixed martial artist, licensed professional
kickboxer, licensed professional Muay Thai fighter, or athlete

4 licensed by the commission other than a boxer.

5 18888.2. (a) The commission shall, consistent with the 6 purposes of this article, establish a pension plan for martial artists 7 who engage in mixed martial arts contests in this state.

8 (b) The commission shall, consistent with the purposes of this 9 article, establish the method by which the pension plan will be financed, including those who shall contribute to the financing of 10 the pension plan. The method of financing the pension plan may 11 12 include, but is not limited to, assessments on tickets, revenue 13 through the sale of sport paraphernalia and souvenirs, and 14 contributions by martial artists, managers, promoters, or any one 15 or more of these persons, in an amount sufficient to finance the

16 pension plan.

(c) Any pension plan established by the commission shall beactuarially sound.

19 18888.3. (a) At the time of payment of the fee required by 20 Section 18824, a promoter shall pay to the commission all amounts

scheduled for contribution to the pension plan for martial artists.

22 If the commission, in its discretion, requires pursuant to Section

18888.2, that contributions to the pension plan be made by the

24 martial artist and their manager, those contributions shall be made

25 at the time and in the manner prescribed by the commission.

(b) All contributions to finance the pension plan for martial
artists shall be deposited in the State Treasury and credited to the
Mixed Martial Arts (MMA) Pension Fund, which is hereby created.
Notwithstanding the provisions of Section 13340 of the
Government Code, all moneys in the MMA Pension Fund are
hereby continuously appropriated to be used exclusively for the
purposes and administration of the pension plan.

33 (c) The MMA Pension Fund is a retirement fund, and no moneys
34 within it shall be deposited or transferred to the General Fund.

35 (d) The commission has exclusive control of all funds in the

36 MMA Pension Fund. No transfer or disbursement in any amount

37 from this fund shall be made except upon the authorization of the

38 commission and for the purpose and administration of the pension

39 plan.

1 (e) Except as otherwise provided in this subdivision, the 2 commission or its designee shall invest the money contained in 3 the MMA Pension Fund according to the same standard of care as 4 provided in Section 16040 of the Probate Code. The commission 5 has exclusive control over the investment of all moneys in the 6 MMA Pension Fund. Except as otherwise prohibited or restricted 7 by law, the commission may invest the moneys in the fund through 8 the purchase, holding, or sale of any investment, financial 9 instrument, or financial transaction that the commission in its 10 informed opinion determines is prudent.

(f) The administrative costs associated with investing, managing, and distributing the MMA Pension Fund shall be limited to no more than 2 percent of the corpus of the fund. Diligence shall be exercised by administrators in order to lower the fund's expense ratio as far below 2 percent as feasible and appropriate. The commission shall report to the Legislature on the impact of this provision during the next regularly scheduled sunset review.


18 18888.4. (a) A promoter may, but is not required to, add to 19 the price of each ticket sold for a professional mixed martial arts contest an amount specifically designated on the ticket for 20 21 contribution or as a donation, either or both, to the pension plan 22 established pursuant to Section 18888.2. The additional amount 23 shall not be subject to the admissions tax required by Section 18824 24 or any other deductions. Nothing in this section shall authorize the 25 addition of those amounts to less than all the tickets sold for the 26 professional mixed martial arts contest involved. The promoter 27 shall pay additional contributions collected in accordance with 28 Section 18888.2.

(b) Any additional contributions received pursuant to this section
shall not be considered to offset any of the contributions required
by the commission under Section 18888.2.

32 18888.5. In addition to any other form in which retirement 33 benefits may be distributed under the pension plan, the commission 34 may, in its discretion, award to a covered martial artist an early 35 pension benefit for vocational, education, training, or medical need 36 in the amount contained in the covered martial artist's pension 37 plan account at the time the commission makes this award and in 38 the manner provided in the regulations governing the martial 39 artist's pension plan. This benefit shall be in lieu of a pension.

1 18888.6. The commission shall adopt emergency regulations 2 to implement, interpret, or make specific this section no later than 3 July 1, 2024. The adoption of regulations shall be deemed an 4 emergency and necessary to avoid serious harm to the public peace, health, safety, or general welfare within the meaning of Section 5 11342.545 of the Government Code, and the commission need not 6 make a written finding of emergency as required by Section 7 8 11346.1 of the Government Code. Notwithstanding subdivisions 9 (e) and (h) of Section 11346.1 of the Government Code, the board may annually readopt any emergency regulation authorized by this 10 11 section that is the same as or substantially equivalent to an emergency regulation previously adopted pursuant to this section 12 13 until January 1, 2026.

BACKGROUND

The Department of Consumer Affairs asked the Commission to look into getting legislation to increase the gate tax cap, the Commission office has been working with Assemblymember Wendy Carrillo on this.

Proposed language changes to Business and Professions Code Section 18824 have been drafted for review.

RECOMMENDATION

I recommend the Commission approve the attached proposed changes to Business and Professions Code Section 18824 and support and sponsor Assemblymember Carrillo's bill, AB1703.

18824.

(a) Except as provided in Sections 18646 and 18832, every person who conducts a contest or wrestling exhibition shall, within 72 hours after the determination of every contest or wrestling exhibition for which admission is charged and received, furnish to the commission the following:

(1) A written report executed under penalty of perjury by one of the officers, showing the amount of the gross receipts, not to exceed <u>four million dollars (\$4,000,000)</u>, <u>two million dollars</u> (\$2,000,000), and the gross price for the contest or wrestling exhibition charged directly or indirectly and no matter by whom received, for the sale, lease, or other exploitation of broadcasting and television rights of the contest or wrestling exhibition, and without any deductions, except for expenses incurred for one broadcast announcer, telephone line connection, and transmission mobile equipment facility, which may be deducted from the gross taxable base when those expenses are approved by the commission.

(2) A fee of 5 percent, exclusive of any federal taxes paid thereon, of the amount paid for admission to the contest or wrestling exhibition, except that for any one contest, the fee shall not exceed the amount of <u>two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000)</u>. one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000). The commission shall report to the Legislature on the fiscal impact of the <u>two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000)</u> one-hundred-thousand-dollar (\$100,000) limit on fees collected by the commission for admissions revenues during its next sunset review.

(A) The amount of the gross receipts upon which the fee provided for in paragraph (2) is calculated shall not include any assessments levied by the commission under Section 18711.

(B) If the fee for any one boxing contest exceeds <u>one hundred forty thousand dollars</u> (\$140,000)seventy thousand dollars (\$70,000), the amount in excess of <u>one hundred forty</u> thousand dollars (\$140,000)seventy thousand dollars (\$70,000)_shall be paid one-half to the commission and one-half to the Boxers' Pension Fund.

(C) If the commission creates a Mixed Martial Arts Pension Fund and the fee for any one mixed martial arts contest exceeds one hundred forty thousand dollars (\$140,000), the amount in excess of one hundred forty thousand dollars (\$140,000) shall be paid one-half to the commission and one-half to the Mixed Martial Arts Pension Fund.


(C)(D) The fee shall apply to the amount actually paid for admission and not to the regular established price.

(D)(E) No fee is due in the case of a person admitted free of charge. However, if the total number of persons admitted free of charge to a boxing, kickboxing, or martial arts contest, or wrestling exhibition exceeds 33 percent of the total number of spectators, then a fee of one dollar (\$1) per complimentary ticket or pass used to gain admission to the contest shall be paid to the commission for each complimentary ticket or pass that exceeds the numerical total of 33 percent of the total number of the total number of spectators.

(E)(F) The minimum fee for an amateur contest or exhibition shall not be less than one thousand dollars (\$1,000). The minimum fee for a professional contest or exhibition shall not be less than one thousand two hundred fifty dollars (\$1,250).

(3) A fee of up to 5 percent, to be established by the commission through regulations to become operative on or before July 1, 2008, and updated periodically as needed, of the gross price, exclusive of any federal taxes paid thereon, for the sale, lease, or other exploitation of broadcasting or television rights thereof, except that in no case shall the fee be less than one thousand dollars (\$1,000) or more than thirty-five thousand dollars (\$35,000).

(b) As used in this section, "person" includes a promoter, club, individual, corporation, partnership, association, or other organization, and "wrestling exhibition" means a performance of wrestling skills and techniques by two or more individuals, to which admission is charged or which is broadcast or televised, in which the participating individuals are not required to use their best efforts in order to win, and for which the winner may have been selected before the performance commences.

BACKGROUND

At the October 15, 2019, the Commission voted to approve the proposed changes to Section 299, of Article 6, of Division 2, of Title 4 of the California Code of Regulations – Dehydration and Rehydration, to set a maximum weight gain from day of weigh-in to day of competition.

On July 26, 2022, the Legal Affairs Division completed their 2nd level review of the rulemaking and recommended edits. On December 29,2022 Staff made the changes and sent them back to the Legal Affairs office. On January 23, 2023, Legal Affairs notified staff that the changes to the proposed text must be approved by the Commission.

RECOMMENDATION

I recommend the Commission approve the attached proposed changes to Section 299, of Article 6, of Division 2, of Title 4 of the California Code of Regulations – Dehydration and Rehydration, to set a maximum weight gain from day of weigh-in to day of competition.

CALIFORNIA STATE ATHLETIC COMMISSION

PROPOSED LANGUAGE

Modifications to the proposed regulatory language are shown in <u>underline</u> for new text and strikeout for deleted text.

Amend Section 299 of Article 6 of Chapter 1 of Division 2 of Title 4 of the California Code of Regulations to read as follows:

§ 299. Dehydration and Rehydration.

- (a) Contestants shall only rehydrate orally. Use of intravenous therapies to rehydrate shall prohibit the athlete from competing.
- (b) Contestants may be required to submit a urine specimen for a urine specific gravity test prior to competition to verify proper hydration.
- (c) In addition to the official weigh-in required by section 297 ("official weigh-in"), contestants may shall be required to re-weigh on the day of the contest, no more than 3 hours before the event at a time and at a place designated by the commission, in the presence of a commission representative, on scales approved by the commission. Any contestant gaining 10-14.9% of their body weight back from official weigh-in, per section 297, the Commission may, upon medical recommendation, require the contestant to move up a weight class, as specified in section 298, for future contests. Any contestant gaining 15% or more of their body weight back from the official weigh-in to the day of competition, per section 297, shall have their contest cancelled.
- (d) Promoters, Managers, Professional Trainers, and Matchmakers are responsible for ensuring-shall ensure that the contracted contestants comply with this section by not offering matches to contestants that are not in the appropriate weight class.

About the California State Athletic Commission

The California State Athletic Commission (Commission) is responsible for protecting the health and safety of its licensees: boxers, kickboxers, and other martial arts athletes. Concerned with athlete injuries and death, the public established the Commission by initiative in 1924. The Commission is responsible for implementation and enforcement of the Federal Muhammad Ali Boxing Reform Act (Federal Boxing Act) and the California Boxing Act or State Athletic Commission Act (State Act). The Commission has four main functions: licensing, enforcement, regulating events and administering the Professional Boxers' Pension Fund (Pension Plan).

Specifically, the Commission establishes requirements for licensure, issues and renews licenses, approves and regulates events, assigns ringside officials, investigates complaints received, and enforces applicable laws by issuing fines and suspending or revoking licenses.

The Commission is one of 38 boards, bureaus, committees, and other programs at the Department of Consumer Affairs (DCA).

The Commission is comprised of seven members. Five members are appointed by the Governor and subject to confirmation by the Senate Committee on Rules. One member is appointed by the Senate Committee on Rules and one member is appointed by the Speaker of the Assembly. Commissioners are part-time employees who receive a \$100-a-day per diem. While there are no qualifications for an individual appointed to the Commission, no person currently licensed as a promoter, manager or judge may serve on the Commission. The law also specifies that efforts should be made to ensure at least four members have experience in either medicine as a licensed physician or surgeon specializing in neurology, neurosurgery, head trauma or sports medicine, financial management, public safety, and the sports regulated by the Commission.

The Commission Executive Officer (EO) is appointed by the Commission, subject to approval by the Director of DCA. The current EO has served since November 2012.

How Does the Commission Accomplish its Mission?

The Commission provides direction, management, and control for professional and amateur boxing, professional and amateur kickboxing, and all forms and combinations of full contact martial arts contests, including mixed martial arts (MMA) and matches or exhibitions conducted, held or given in California.

The Commission meets about six times per year to:

- Handle matters related to licensure and appeals of license denials, suspensions and fines.
- Propose and review regulations or legislation focused on maintaining the health and safety of fighters.
- Consider issues related to the Boxer's Pension Program and the Neurological Examination Account.
- Evaluate funding and revenue strategies.
- Address a variety of topics brought forth by stakeholders.

2015-2018 Strategic Plan Accomplishments

The Commission accomplished the following goals since the adoption of the previous 2015-2018 strategic plan.

- In 2015, the California State Athletic Commission officially established the practice of dehydration and weight cutting as one of the largest industry wide health concerns. A summit was held in California on June 7, 2018, and the most pertinent issues were addressed first. Nearly 3 years later, after policies and regulations were implemented in the sport of mixed martial arts, the commission is expanding its efforts and successful protocol into the sport of boxing.
- 2. Legislation was chaptered that allows the Commission to fund special neurological examinations and explore new diagnostic imaging and testing to be used in relation to the examinations required by this section. The Commission obtained a contract with C3 Logix to provide the necessary tools to conduct neurological testing of athletes. This testing determines the relationship between the biomechanics of impact forces to the brain and their behavioral and physiological sequences to advance diagnostics, athlete care, return to play standards, understanding of the acute and long-term effects on brain health, and effective rehabilitation techniques to allow a safer environment for competition. The results of these tests are used to assist the Commission in making policy decisions regarding the health and safety of the athletes. The neurological testing is given before and after competition. This is a mission critical function that promotes the health, safety and welfare of participants in regulated combat sporting events.
- 3. The Commission promulgated the following regulations:
 - Pension Sections 401 406. The Commission identified three main problems with the administration of certain pension program regulations. First, the Plan regulations related to Lost Beneficiary / Forfeitures, section 405 (d), were not followed by the third-party administrator. The third-party administrator stated the 405 (d) regulation language was not followed because its intent was not clear. Secondly, the Commission identified some of the problems created by the third-party administrator not following 405 (d). Finally, the commission identified a funding source deficiency in the original language related to the Lost Beneficiary/ Forfeiture provisions. The changes in this regulation package addressed these problems.
 - Definitions, Prohibited Substances and Methods, Therapeutic Use Exemptions, Transgender Athletes – Sections 201.5, 303, 424-426 and 830-837. This regulation change mainly addressed the issues of prohibited substances and Transgender athletes. The Commission amended its regulations to adopt very strict bans on prohibited substances and methods; adopt a new regulation identifying the circumstances under which an athlete,

when medically necessary, may receive approval to use a prohibited substance or method; adopt a regulation setting out the rules governing Transgender athletes who apply to compete in Commission-regulated events. This rulemaking also made a technical clean-up amendment to one of its definitions, necessitated by the proposed adoption of "Transgender Athletes" regulations.

- **Headgear** Section 610. This regulation change required the use of headgear in amateur contests for the protection of amateur boxers.
- Dehydration & Rehydration Sections 297, 299 and 300. This regulation change was necessary to have an immediate effect in providing a safer weigh-in procedure as well as testing of athletes for severe dehydration prior to a bout. It helps prevent athletes from using severe dehydration as a method to make the contracted bout weight. The regulation change allows the CSAC appointed ringside physicians to test athletes for dehydration and to remove a contestant from a fight if the athlete is deemed to be severely dehydrated. Also, the regulation change prohibits the use of intravenous therapies to regain hydration after a weigh-in.
- **Payment of Contestants** Section 232. This regulation change mainly addressed that Athletes are not provided a minimum purse for fighting. This has allowed some promoters to exploit athletes by paying them \$1.00 instead of an industry minimum. This regulation set a minimum purse amount of one hundred dollars (\$100) per round.

To understand the environment in which the Commission operates and identify factors that could impact the Commission's success, the California Department of Consumer Affairs' SOLID unit conducted an environmental scan of the internal and external environments by collecting information through the following methods:

- An online survey sent to stakeholders comprised of professionals, retired professionals, professional associations, promoters, media representatives and others who expressed interest in the strategic direction of the Commission. The online survey received 89 responses.
- One-on-one interviews with Commissioners, Executive Officer, and Assistant Executive Officer in July and August 2018.
- Focus group discussions with Commission staff in July 2018.

The most significant themes and trends identified from the environmental scan were discussed by the Commission during a strategic planning session facilitated by SOLID on October 2, 2018. This information guided the Commission in the development of the strategic goals and objectives outlined in this 2018 – 2023 strategic plan.

California State Athletic Commission Disciplinary Guidelines for CCR §303 Violations Revised October 15, 2019

For most anabolic steroids and agents, two (2) nanograms is the <u>minimum required</u> performance levels for WADA-accreditation as an anti-doping laboratory. The California State Athletic Commission is proposing to establish disciplinary guidelines that specify at what point the Commission will take disciplinary action against a licensee.

Except as provided otherwise below, the CSAC Prohibited List shall incorporate the most current Prohibited List published by WADA, as well as any WADA Technical Documents establishing decision limits or reporting levels.

Notwithstanding the WADA Prohibited List and any otherwise applicable WADA Technical Documents, the following modifications shall be in full force and effect:

- Decision Concentration Levels. Adverse Analytical Findings reported at a concentration below the following Decision Concentration Levels shall be managed by CSAC as Atypical Findings.
 - Clomiphene: 0.1 ng/ml¹
 - Dehydrochloromethyltestosterone (DHCMT) long-term metabolite (M3): 0.1 ng/ml
 - · Hydrochlorothiazide (HCTZ) and metabolites: 20 ng/ml (Out-of-Competition only)
 - Ostarine: 0.1 ng/ml²
 - Dihydroxy-LGD-4033 metabolite (LGD-4033 metabolite): 1/1,000 of the relative concentration of the pooled excretion urine standard³
 - Epitrenbolone (Trenbolone metabolite): 0.2 ng/ml
 - Zeranol: 1 ng/ml
 - Zilpaterol: 1 ng/mL

¹² If only clomiphene or ostarine metabolite(s) are reported, in the absence of any parent compound or with the parent compound below the Decision Concentration Level, the report shall be managed by CSAC as an Atypical Finding. The Commission held a Stakeholder's Meeting on October 15, 2019, to discuss drug testing thresholds in combat sports and taking on a commonsense approach to anti-doping.

The Commission made revisions to the Disciplinary Guidelines for CCR 303 Violations.

³ Dihydroxy-LGD-4033 shall be re-evaluated once a reference standard becomes available to the WADAaccredited laboratories.

The Commission held events during COVID. DCA's Regulations unit worked with the Commission to create what was considered the safest COVID Bubble in combat sports.

New procedures were created to track COVID testing of all people involved with each event that included testing and screening questionnaires.

Office staff worked with inspectors and promoters to set up each venue according to the recommended safety standards.

Commissions legal counsel, Ken Swenson, is cc'd on all EO reports to the Commissioners.



Commission staff are advised not to speak to media. Media inquires are forwarded to the EO.






Acknowledgment of Statutes and Regulations Applicable to Officials

Pursuant to the California Code of Regulations (CCR) § 204, all officials and applicants for official's license shall submit to the California State Athletic Commission (Commission) this Acknowledgement of Statutes and Regulations Applicable to Officials.

	Statute and/or Regulation	Initial
1.	The Commission prescribes the standards that are necessary for the licensure of officials. (B&P Code § 18648).	
2.	Officials shall immediately notify the Commission of any change of address in writing, providing the Commission with the old and new address. If the official fails to provide the commission with this information, the official may be fine, his/her license may be suspended or revoked. (CCR § 205; B&P §18841-18843).	
3.	I acknowledge and understand that licensure as an official does not create an entitlement to be assigned. (CCR § 330, 370; B&P §18648).	
4.	Falsification in whole or in part of a material fact or presentation on any application for a license shall result in a license being denied, and if previously granted, revoked unless otherwise ordered by the commission, or the official may be fined. (CCR § 210; B&P §18841-18843).	
5.	Officials shall be proficient in the profession of officiating combat sports. (CCR § 371, 379).	
6.	Officials shall be in good physical condition with the speed and reflexes in the ring necessary for the protection of the fighters. If an official is determined not be in good physical condition by the commission, the commission may refuse, suspend or revoke the official's license. (CCR § 371; B&P §18841, 18842).	
7.	In its discretion, the commission may order a special medical examination to be undertaken by any official, the report of which shall be made to the commission. The cost of the examination shall be shared equally by the commission and the licensee. Failure by the official to comply with this order may result in a fine, suspension or revocation of the official's license. (B&P §18710, 18841-18843).	
8.	All referees shall submit to an annual regular examination to establish their physical fitness to perform as a referee. This examination may be conducted by representatives of the commission or at the direction of the commission. All examination results shall be approved by the commission. Failure to submit to a regular examination or to comply with the commission's direction regarding examination may result in a fine, or the suspension or revocation of the referee's license. (CCR § 375, 805; B&P §18841-18843).	
9.	Officials must pass a written examination administered by the commission, as requested by the commission, on the fundamentals of boxing, refereeing and judging matches and contests, and California law and regulations relating to the sport. Failure to take the written examination or failure to pass the written examination may result in a fine, or suspension or revocation of the official's license (CCR § 371, 379, 543; B&P §18841-18843)	

All licensed Officials are required to complete the "Acknowledgment of Statutes and Regulations" form when applying or renewing their license. Goal 6 – Pension Plan The Commission effectively manages the California Professional Boxers Pension Plan







II. Membership Information

Each year, USA Boxing begins registration for the following calendar year on November 1st. This is the busiest time of year for the organization, as we see a large spike in memberships in preparation for some of the country's most notable events, such as the Silver Gloves, Golden Gloves, and our Q1 National Event. Below is USA Boxing's registration data from October 1, 2022, through December 31, 2022.

Standard Memberships

There are two categories of memberships, athlete, and non-athlete. This includes boxers, coaches and officials, looking to train, spar, and compete at sanctioned USA Boxing events. Membership fees are calculated by LBC. USA Boxing collects a standard amount of \$55.00 - \$75.00, per athlete membership and \$75.00 for each non-athlete membership (amounts vary by location). The remainder is voted on by the LBC's Board of Directors to assist the organization (LBC) with administrative fees and other expenses. The chart below illustrates registration and revenue numbers for each region in California for both Q4 of 2022 and the entirety of 2022.

- The IKF hit a milestone of sanctioning over **350 FULL CONTACT EVENTS** in California alone, since our appointment in 2014!! We continue to maintain the highest of safety standards for fighters in the industry. Congratulations to all who have been a part of the last 9 years of success in IKF California!!




EVENT TYPES

 From January 1, 2022, to December 31, 2022, the California State Athletic Commission (commission) regulated a total of 116 professional combat sports events. Boxing events accounted for 74 of those events, 33 were mixed martial arts, 9 were kickboxing/Muay Thai. In total the commission regulated an estimated 3,869 rounds of combative sports with the Executive Officer approving an estimated 800 bouts .






2022 EVENTS AND BOUTS





TELEVISION TAX






DRUG TESTING










WEIGHT DATA-BOXING



WEIGHT DATA-MMA




WEIGHT DATA-KICKBOXING




C3LOGIX NEUROLOGICAL TEST UPDATE

The commission continues to perform baseline examinations on many fighters throughout the state. In December of 2016, the Advisory Committee on Medical and Safety Standards (Medical Advisory Committee or MAC) established objectives for implementing the C3 Logix Sports Concussion Management Program (program). As December 2022, the commission has completed approximately 2,185 baseline/follow-up tests since the program commenced.
